### From the Principal's Desk

This line encourages us- to strive constantly and not lose hope. The National Assessment and Accreditation Council visited us early this academic year to evaluate us and while we made significant progress in all areas reckoned in the different criteria and were able to retain our 'A' Grade, we were



disheartened with the score. But not for long, in a true heroic spirit, we soon picked up the pieces and marched along.

Ulysses was undoubtedly a great Greek hero in the Trojan war. It is said, that it was he who devised the Trojan horse that finally brought the ten year old war to a close. After his long adventures in the island of the Lotus Eaters, his encounter with the Cyclopes and the Sirens and his journey to the underworld, he finally reached Ithaca and was reunited with his wife, Penelope. He soon took over the reins of the kingdom.

We would all would agree that he had his share of adventure and would be entitled to a life of comfort and ease. But, true to his heroic and valiant spirit, he gave up this idle life and with a few faithful friends was determined to seek out fresh adventures. His courage and determination to strive constantly, to seek and find and not give up, is something all of us must be encouraged to follow. We are often tossed by the storms of life and easily lose heart, but these lines remind and encourage us to get going and raise our spirits, to tackle head on, all the challenges that come our way.

In June we had orientation programmes for parents and students to acquaint them with our examination pattern, our rules of discipline, the importance of attendance and facilities we offer. A library orientation was also organized to enlighten our students about e-resources available and steps to be followed to access this vast and valuable resource.

Guest lectures, field trips and film screenings make the teaching-learning process exciting and our staff members in all departments are encouraged to think out of the box and engage our students with what is current and relevant.

Conflict Writing was the theme that seemed popular this year. In August, Dr. Shefali Shah on behalf of 'Literature Live' conducted a workshop for our BMM and Literature students. On 2 September, the English Department organized a conference on "Literature of War, Conflict and Trauma: Post-Colonial Perspectives and Approaches".Our Keynote speaker was Dr. E.

V. Ramakrishnan, Professor Emeritus, School of Language, Literature and Culture Studies, Central University of Gujarat. His address was on "Poet as Witness: Images of Traumatic Suffering from Zones of Conflict in Asia." There were fourteen papers presented, out of these, seven were by scholars from Gujarat and one from Nasik.

Following quickly on its heels was a student seminar on "Folklore" jointly organised by the Sociology and History departments. We encourage our students to undertake research and read beyond their syllabus, and we were happy when they come forward to present their research findings.

We set aside a common theme for an Inter-Departmental student seminar and this year the theme chosen was "Women Icons". Students' presentations were based on iconic figures such as St. Mother Teresa, Mahashweta Devi, Sylvia Plath, Charlotte Bronte, Pandita Ramabai, Chanda Kochar, Mary Kom, Malala Yousafzani and Irom Sharmila, to name a few.

In January this year we had a special play based on the life of St. Mother Teresa to celebrate her canonization. We feel particularly close to her as she laid the foundation stone of our college. Her spirit moves us to look after the concerns of the poor and marginalized and this we do through our Social Outreach programme, the Faith on Campus programme and the NSS.

On 11 February the Cardinal Paul Poupard Foundation Chair and the UNESCO Chair for Inter-Religious and Inter-Cultural Dialogue organised an International Symposium on "Family and Nation Building". Our Chief Guest, the Consul General of Italy, His Excellency Ugo Ciarlatani had unfortunately been called away on important business just before the symposium but his speech was read out by his secretary Dr. Maria Luisa Rossi. Our Keynote speaker was Dr. Fr. Rudolf Heredia, Founder Director of Social-Science Centre- St. Xavier's College, Mumbai who concentrated on Nationalism. Fr. Cajetan Menezes, Director, Family Service Centre – Snehalaya enlightened the audience on, "Challenges of Family Life in Modern India and the Role of Value Education to Build a Happy and Stable Nation". Our other speakers included Dr. Astrid Lobo Gajiwala, Kapil Devdas and Irfan Engineer.

On 25 February the Department of Economics organised a conference on 'Good Governance.' The Keynote speaker was Mr. Sailesh Gandhi, Former, Information Commissioner with the Central Information Commission, New Delhi. This was followed by a special lecture by Prof. Arun Kumar, retired professor Jawaharlal Nehru University and a Panel Discussion with Darryl D'Monte, Prof Sudha Mohan, Rohini Pandit and Indrapal Singh. This was ably moderated by Ernest Fernandes.

On 17 March the Staff Advancement Committee took the staff for an academic excursion to the Dr. Bhau Daji Lad Museum. It is apparently the oldest museum in the city and was established in 1872 as the former, Victoria and Albert Museum. It was a rare delight to see the city's cultural heritage and history through a rare collection of Decorative Arts that

highlight various communities and trades of the people from the late eighteenth to earlytwentieth centuries. Unfortunately we missed seeing the Humboldt Penguins in the Byculla Zoo as they were supposed to be on display the following day.

We congratulate the Accounts department for organizing the first certificate course on Basic Income Tax. Twenty students enrolled together with two staff members. The next batch is scheduled to begin in April 2017.

We are very proud that 15 of our students are travelling to France on an Educational Exchange programme between our college and the Institution of Jean-Paul II in Compiegne. Our Rector, Fr. Magi Murzello and Prof. Clementia will accompany them. They will be there from 3 May to 17 May 2017. We hope this will be the first of our many linkages.

Our new Rector – Fr. Magi Murzello has been in the education field for several years. He has a string of very impressive degrees and is brimming over with creative ideas. He has introduced daily mass in our college and is revitalizing the Spiritual Quotient of our students. We thank him, the Managing Trustee – Fr. Caesar D'Mello and the other Trustees for their support and encouragement in whatever we do.

- Invited to design the syllabus for F.Y.B.A English Literature Paper I by the Board of Studies in English, University of Mumbai, 27 June 2016.

## **Department News**

## **English Literary Association**

Our activities for the year began with a guest lecture by Dr. Shefali Shah, (ex-HOD, Department of English, St. Xavier's College), on 'Conflict Writing' (3 August) under the aegis of Tata Literature Live. Dr. Shah introduced our students to various writers, from India and across the world, who had used literature as a means of drawing attention to the wide range of conflicts that had afflicted their lives and adversely affected the world at large. Co-incidentally, our own annual seminar was also based on the same theme. Titled 'Literature of War, Conflict and Trauma: Post Colonial Perspectives and Approaches' (2 September), the one-day national conference saw paper presenters addressing a variety of conflicts that had plagued the world – Naxalite violence, the Kashmir conflict, the World Wars and Partition. Our Keynote speaker was Dr. E. V. Ramakrishnan, Professor Emeritus, School of Language, Literature and Culture Studies, Central University of Gujarat. His address was on "Poet as Witness: Images of Traumatic Suffering from Zones of Conflict in Asia." Fourteen papers were presented; out of these, seven were by scholars from Gujarat and one from Nasik.

FY.B.A. students got an opportunity to interact with Amin Sheikh, author of 'Bombay Mumbai Life is Life: I am because of You' on 11 August. Sheikh captivated the class with his heart-wrenching but inspirational story about his rise from a run-away street child to a writer, a motivational speaker, and owner of the unique library café, 'From Bombay to Barcelona' which was inaugurated on 15 August 2016. He urged the students to remain humble and grounded, and never to take their privileges and comforts for granted. On 18 August, students got another opportunity to motivate themselves to aim high when exstudent Leandro Dysilva made time to visit his alma mater and deliver a talk on 'Leadership'. He enlightened students on the traits that made for successful leaders, and also shared his own struggle in the years after graduation until his successful stint at Harvard a few years later. Earlier in the month, students also attended a poetry reading by diasporic poet Darius Cooper at National College, Bandra West (5 August).

After a lull of a few months due to the semester exams, we went into overdrive in the months of January and February. Towards the end of January we conducted our annual 'Film Week' based on the lives of writers. The first film 'Capote', was based on the real-life story of journalist Truman Capote's complex relationship with a murderer he befriended in order to write a book he later called 'In Cold Blood'. 'The Diving Bell and the Butterfly', was a moving film about the real-life story of the French editor of Elle magazine, Jean-Dominique Bauby, depicting his agony after he was left completely immobile after a stroke. Able only to move his left eye, he still managed to communicate his thoughts and feelings, and publish his

memoir. The last film 'Sylvia', was based on the tragic life of renowned American confessional poet Sylvia Plath who succumbed to her depression, and frustration with her marriage to the famous poet Ted Hughes, finally ending her life by gassing herself in the kitchen. The three films were selected for their potential to enable students to realise how writers who suffered intensely not only struggled to deal with their pain but succeeded in converting their frustration and angst into great writing.

The Film Week was soon followed by the Literature Week in February. The enthusiasm of our students, particularly those from the first year, saw a successful week of exciting events. Other than the usual Treasure Hunt (the event that had the maximum participation), and the Spell Bee, we had new contests like Scrabble, Turncoat, Taboo and Lampoon. These events were organised independently by the organising team, and their fun-loving spirit coupled with superb organisational skills made all the difference. The department is particularly grateful to all those who took charge of and efficiently carried out the different events, namely Susheel Varghese (Turncourt), Soujanya Rangawar (Lampoon), Kristianne Mascarenhas, Kelly Waller and Stacy Fernandes (Spell Bee, Treasure Hunt, Flash Fiction, Taboo), Stacy Fernandes and Aruna Iyer (Scrabble). F.Y.B.A. students also made time to put up a short performance of Shakespeare's 'Twelfth Night' on the first day of the Literature Week.

Last but not the least, our newsletter ELAN also saw the light of day in February. From short stories to poems to short articles on writers, the newsletter had it all.

## **History Association**

The History Department began the year with a guest lecture by Ritika Nandkeolyar, Consul for Political, Economic & Public Affairs 2014-2016 Canadian Consulate General, Mumbai on 'Gender Equality, A Personal Perspective from a Canadian in India in June itself. One of the goals of the History Department is to encourage students to develop their skills to select, study and present their work accurately and effectively. The History Department thus began a partnership with the Sociology Department and this August, the fifth Annual Socio-History Student Seminar was held. Based on the theme of 'Folklore' the seminar saw 8 student presenters, and the details of their topics have been given in the Sociology Department report. Also with a view to enhance research and presentation skills, Principal Dr. M. Fernandes initiated the Inter-Department Student Seminar three years ago. This year's seminar held in September on 'Women Icons' had over 20 student presenters! Details are given later in a separate report.

August and September were super busy months for in addition to the two student seminars, screenings of the popular films 'Gandhi' and 'The Legend of Bhagat Singh', field visits to Mani Bhavan, The Discovery of India and a Heritage Walk to Bandra Fort, Bandstand and Mt. Mary's Basilica were conducted. The heritage walks are particularly popular with students at it gives them a chance to discover little hidden gems of Mumbai city such as the Parsi colony at Bandra Bandstand. Besides bringing History alive, these visits often inspire students to re-visit these iconic places, one along with family and friends.

In the second term, the department had two Career Talks; one by ex-student Procilla Almeida on 'Instructional Writing', and the other by Nahida Coelho of the New Zealand Tertiary College on their courses in early childhood learning and employment opportunities

in New Zealand. Another Heritage walk from Churchgate station to the Asiatic Society and Kala Ghoda tossed up other lovely jewels of Mumbai such as St. Thomas Cathedral and the University of Mumbai. Field trips to the Diocesan Heritage Museum at St. Pius Seminary and the Bhau Daji Lad Museum rounded off the year. The History Department was also proud to receive invitations from the Archdiocesan Museum and Cipla Archives for student interns. We hope that some of our students will avail of this opportunity thereby enhancing the Department with their experience.

## **Economics Association**

On July 26, 2016, the students of the T.Y.B.Com were addressed by members of the editorial team of The Indian Express on the topic "Modi and the Indian Economy". The lecture provided data on the Indian economy and discussed the same.

On August 29, 2016 a guest lecture was delivered by Principal Agnelo Menezes of St. Xavier's College, on 'Careers through Economics.'

On January 21, 2017, T.Y.B.A students were taken on a field trip to the Mahalakshmi Saras Mela, a fair organised to portray the efforts of self-help groups in the country.

A talk on "Demonetisation: A Banker's Point of View" was held on January 23, 2017, for students of Economics (B.A and B.Com). The speech covered the practical aspects of demonetisation and the manner in which individuals could be a part of this process through the various Apps available.

Throughout the year first year students participated in quizzes and word mashes on a faculty member's blog.

On February 25, 2017, a UGC-sponsored national symposium on 'Good Governance' was organised by the Departments of Economics and Business Economics in the Conference Room. More than ninety students as well as members of the local community were present.

The concept of governance was broadly conceived to include both sectoral and social aspects. In retrospect the choice of theme turned out to be premonitory given the corporate governance problems faced by the Tatas and Infosys. Enthusiasm was high among the student participants who numbered over ninety. In addition, the local community was also represented.

Shailesh Gandhi, former Central Information Commissioner and pioneering RTI activist, dealt with the information disclosure aspects of the theme. Mr Gandhi has led from the front with a paperless office of his own and has filed over 22,000 RTI applications. He fine tuned some of the recommendations he has been making vociferously over many years. He recommends digitalisation of government functioning with files being made available on

the internet, except of for aspects like security that would jeopardize government functioning. In anticipating aspects of the address of the next speaker Shailesh Gandhi has castigated the RBI for its silence on demonetization. He noted a well known observation that the current government is set upon trampling upon citizen rights. Only an educated and active populace can address this assault.

Arun Kumar, retired Sukhamoy Chakravarty Professor of Economics, Jawaharlal Nehru University, set the tone for the theme in his Special Lecture by recalling that the Indian economy has been in the condition of stubborn recession for some time. Unemployment was rising, investment was moribund, banks were groaning under NPAs, and so on. The shock of demonetization to the economy alongside the preponderance of the informal and unorganized sector in the Indian economy implies that irreversibilities have come to play and it is best to forecast with a post-November 2016 base of zero or negative growth. Professor Kumar has visited wholesale markets across the country and reports that traders expect a fall of 20% to 30% over normal circumstances. A lot of cash is used therein because of rapid turnover. People hold cash for precautionary purposes. This money is white. Black money, on the other hand, is not to be found in sacks or mattresses but in real estate and/or tucked in tax havens abroad.

The next section was a panel discussion on various aspects of the theme. Mr Darryl D'Monte, noted journalist, author, and environmental activist connected governance with the construction of a massive and costly coastal road that would pass through the locality and that would destroy mangroves and livelihoods in its wake. Local affected communities should organize and fight this violation of the ecological balance of their neighborhood. Dr Rohini Pandit, well-known lawyer, dealt with the legal nuances of the theme. She observed that the law is above board. It is for the people, students and teachers, to distinguish between the spirit and the letter of the law and bring the distinction to the attention of the political authorities and other organs of the state. Professor Sudha Mohan, Head, Department of Civics & Politics, University, gave a scholarly overview of all aspects of the term 'Governance', illuminating various theories with illustrations from the city of Mumbai. Mr. Inderpal Singh, past President of the Process Equipment of Godrej, spoke of corporate governance and the new facets of the concept that are regularly thrown up by established houses. The discussion was ably moderated by Mr Ernest Fernandes who is intimately involved with the college. He is a member of the LMC and IQAC of the college and is always an animated contributor to meetings like these.

The discussion continued over lunch and the group dispersed reluctantly much later.

## **Sociology Association**

The department conducted various co-curricular activities to instil in the students an analytical viewpoint on contemporary social issues. The department conducted students' seminars, educational visits, and guest lectures. Documentaries too were screened which was followed by discussions and critical evaluations. In addition, students made presentations on various topics related to their syllabi.

The theme for the Socio-History Student Seminar for the year was 'Folklores- A Socio-Historical Analysis' Eight students presented papers. The topics included 'Dark Skinned Characters portrayed as Antagonist', 'Witch Hunting', 'Mahabharat from Kaurav Viewpoint', 'Nordic Folklore', 'Native American Folklore,' and 'Women in Indian Mythology'. Director, Dr. Joan Dias from the Heras Institute of Indian History and Culture judged the papers. S.Y.B.A student Fatema Patel's presentation on 'Dissent through Folk Rhythms' won the first prize.

The highlight of this year was organising 'A Sociology Week' from 5-9 December 2016 on the theme 'Popular Culture- Relevance and Concerns in Indian Society'. Prof. Girija Gupte (Sathye College) spoke on 'Popular Culture as a Resistance Movement'. Beliefs, practices, and trends in culture and religion affect eating habits to a large extent at present time. Prof. Mariyah Gour (Rizvi College) had an interesting and interactive session on 'Religion and Food as Popular Culture'. 'Music as a means of popular culture' has been a prominent influential means of dissent throughout history. Prof. Janine Coelho deliberated on this topic by tracing the trajectory of different types of dissent music down the years. The audio visual presentation was a treat for the students. Ms. Rinki Bhattacharya, (Film Director and Feminist) through her documentary 'Behind Closed Doors' brought to the forum the idea of how violence and abuse are emerging as an "unpopular culture". The interactive session on 'Gender Abuse and Violence as Unpopular Culture' was an eye opener to the students. 'Bodies that Matter', a theatrical presentation by Metamorphis Theatre Inc., included a collection of poems associated with kinds of bodies and (mis)representation in popular media.

The Department also organized an educational trip for students to give them a first hand experience of issues related to the destitute, tribals, and the informal sector. They visited Mother Theresa's home for destitute girls, Airoli. The students spent a day interacting with the inmates. This first hand information gave them deep insight into their life and the challenges they face. A tribal visit was organised to Sanjay Gandhi National Park tribal settlement area. This visit was organised through Maharashtra Tribal Welfare Society. The students were allowed to interact with the community and understand the major problems faced by this community of which non-identity status was the prime focus.

To get an experiential knowledge of slums, slum rehabilitation, and the informal sector, a

visit was organised to Dharavi. Besides primary contact with the informal sector workers, they also visited the Khumbhar community (pottery workers) habitation and received first hand information on their work life. Students were exposed to Kunchikurve basti in Kalina (makadwala settlement) where they had a participative experience in data collection. This exposure helped them understand the different methods used for research and surveys. The students were taken to an exhibition of self-help groups. The interaction with the groups highlighted the ways the members gain their identity as individuals, while realising and utilising the immense power of mutual aid. These groups provide them with a platform by which they can access banks and public services, and spearhead changes that affect them as women.

The main aim of the department is to provide holistic learning to the students by blending syllabus and reality to make learning enriching and complete. This is also enhanced through class debates, content analysis, and discussions which make learning interesting. The exstudents of the department were also invited to speak on the career options available in Sociology. This was blended with a session on options for higher education in Sociology.

## **Psychology Association**

A host of activities were conducted by the Andrean Psychology Team (APT) to promote learning and interest in the field of Psychology. This academic year several innovative contests and competitions were held as part of The Psychology Week. The one week long programme was open to students from all fraternities, giving them an opportunity to explore their talents and bring about holistic growth and development. The participation of students from all streams added to the fun and vivacity of the event.

Students were introduced to a new activity "Let's Play a Game" during Psychology Week, engaging in many psychological mind games. Various brain teasers and games to test short term memory and attention span were presented to students. Stroop's test to assess executive functions such as attention and self-regulation capability was also administered to participants. The topic of this year's Psychology Debate was 'Should Euthanasia be Legalised in India?' The students were prompted to think critically about the sensitive issue. The second and third year students competed with each other enthusiastically. Third year students won the competition and it was an insightful experience for the participants.

Power point presentations conducted as a part of the Psychology Week kept the judges and student audience totally enthralled by the wide variety of topics that were covered by the students. Some of the prize winning topics were Parapsychology, Criminal Psychology, Job Satisfaction, Gaming Addiction, and the Psychological Impact of Bullying. Students employed several innovative presentation skills to make the presentations interesting.

A Psychology Quiz was organized during the Andrean Psychology Week. It included many rounds such as "Check your Brain Power", "Spelling Bee Round", "True/False Round" "General Round" and "Rapid fire round". Students participated with great enthusiasm and it was a great learning experience for them.

A wide variety of psychological tests were administered to students to assess them on personality, stress, anxiety, fear, depression, vocation, and interpersonal relationships. The test results gave students an insight into their own behaviour regarding parameters and how they could deal with issues effectively after having a better understanding of self.

In 2016-17 students presented several research papers. The Avishkar research competition was held on January 19, 2017, conducted by the University of Mumbai at SIES College. Students presented on a wide range of Psychology-related topics such as Sleep Paralysis, Autopilot Theory, Representation of Psychological Practices in Bollywood, Self-awareness & Self- Consciousness, Impact of Instagram on Youth, Eating Disorder, and Misrepresentation of Mental Disorders in Cinema.

In the Intracollegiate Avishkar Research Competition, Fatima Patel won the first prize for her presentation on "Misrepresentation of Mental Disorders in Cinema". Two students participated in the Intercollegiate Trishool Competition: A Psychology Research Convention where the theme was 'Shades of Violence... & Beyond'. It was held at S. P. N. Doshi Women's College, Ghatkopar on January 25, 2017. The topic of the students' presentation was "Prostitution: Violence with No Name".

The association screened some educational films like 'Shutter Island' and 'A Beautiful Mind' which helped the students develop insights into the causes and consequences of psychological disorders like schizophrenia, and 'Outsourced' which enlightened them on the impact of cultural diversity.

This year the educational visit was organized for the T.Y.B.A students on January 6, 2017, to The Regional Mental Hospital in Pune. Students got an opportunity to visit various wards of the hospital and interact with the patients. Students were also exposed to the procedure of Electroconvulsive therapy (ECT) live at work on patients. It was an enriching experience for the students.

They prepared charts, posters, and articles reflecting the impact on implementation of GST in India.

On December 20, a competition 'Express your opinion on Demonetisation' was initiated for T.Y.B.Com students and on January 13, 2017, a talk on 'Understanding Demonetisation: Impact on Stock Markets' and a Mock Stock Session was organized for B.Com students. The talk was conducted by Mr. Purv Shah, Equity Market Consultant & Broker, BSE. 144 students attended.

Also in January 2017, 55 B.Com students visited the National Stock Exchange. Hitesh Sethia, Consultant & Trainer, NCFM Academy, gave an overview on practical aspects of Equities Market and online NEAT trading system. The session also focused on NCFM certifications and encouraged the students to appear for NCFM's Online Certification Exam.

On February 8, 2017, the first certificate course on 'Basic Income Tax for an Individual' was started by the Department of Accountancy. 20 students, inclusive of B.A. and B.Com, and two faculty members enrolled. The 20 hour course enabled students to understand the basics of Income Tax, provided training for online or e-filing of income tax returns for individuals having 'Income from Salary' and 'Income from Other Sources' and any procedures prior to and post filing of online returns.

On February 18, a guest lecture on Auditing was organised and attended by 207 students. The lecture was delivered by pracitising CA's Stanislaus Lasrado & Joslin Coutinho, specialising in Audit, Taxation, Company Law as well as Consultancy. The speakers explained topics such as the basic principles of Auditing, Internal Control, Internal Audit & Internal Checks, Vouching and Verification, areas where there is scope for Error and Fraud and Techniques to detect such malpractices. The Department also updated students on current trends in the country by regularly displaying newspaper articles related to Accountancy, Finance and Taxation on the Accountancy Notice Board.

# The UNESCO and Cardinal Paul Poupard Foundation Chair For Inter-Religious And Inter-Cultural Dialogue

The activities for the year 2016-2017 began with the Iftaari celebration marking the end of the Ramadan season on 4 July. Students went on an excursion to Muhammad Ali Road followed by an inter-religious NAAC prayer service on 7 July. Prayers were recited in different languages by students seeking blessings for the ensuing NAAC evaluation. An Orientation session was conducted on 19 July for the first year students to familiarize them with the activities of the Chair.

The competitions began with a presentation on 'A Glimpse of Islamic Culture' staged by SYBA students Asad Shaikh and Mashiyat Khan on 20 July. They touched upon almost every aspect in Islam. It was indeed an eye-opening session. This was followed by the Quiz competition on 21 July, which comprised multiple-choice-type questions based on religion and culture. The competition was fierce, and Michelle D'Souza (SYBCOM) and Aaron D'Souza (TYBCOM) were declared the winners. The Presentation competition was held on 22 July, on the topic 'Status of Women in Various Religions'. Ten students participated, out of which Mikael D'Souza and Rochelle D'Souza won the 1<sup>st</sup> place, Nikita Das won the 2<sup>nd</sup> place and Siddhanth Sinha secured the 3<sup>rd</sup> position. An All India Essay writing competition on 'Role of Education in the Context of Religious Conflicts' saw 27 students participating. On 13 January, Colors of God competition: 'Kite-making' was organized. Jeromi and Sharol won the 1<sup>st</sup> place, the 2<sup>nd</sup> place was awarded to Satin and Neville, while Kimberly and Militia obtained the 3<sup>rd</sup> position. All these various competitions helped students understand the core and evolution of different religions.

On 4 August, we were honored by the presence of Dr. Prashob Koddapully, an eminent psycho-therapist, who conducted an enlightening session on 'Ethics based on Euthanasia and Religion'. A critical analysis of the movie 'Sarabjit', based on secularism, was presented on 12 August by Mikael D'souza, Asad Shaikh and Siddhanth Sinha. To spread the message of peace and harmony on the occasion of Raksha Bandhan, on 17 August, the interreligious team students were asked to tie 'Strings of peace' and write a 'Peace message', and drop them in a peace box. The theme was to promote 'Peace and harmony across all religions and cultures'. Simlyn Jagtap (SYBA) and Selista Mallikal (FYBA) were declared as the winners for the best message.

Various outings were also organized with enthusiasm. On the occasion of the feast of the Nativity of Mother Mary on 3 September, students of all faiths visited the Mount Mary Basilica to honor the Mother of God in prayer and thereafter, with great excitement, proceeded to the much awaited fair. Students also visited Ganapati pandals on 7

September and Durga Devi pandals on 8 October on occasion of the Navratri festival. Students attended a Meditation session organized at Global Vipassana Pagoda, a meditation hall in Gorai, on 11 November. A street play on "Role of Education, Increase in Violence against Women and Need for Peace and Harmony in Society" enacted by students was uploaded on the social media website on 15 December. It was a humorous play which conveyed the message effectively. A visit to Elephanta caves was organized on 17 December. The caves are dated between 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> centuries, and rank amongst the most popular tourist attractions in Maharashtra. A short film competition was organized on 11 February on"India and Culture" for the FYBMM students.

The international symposium was held on 11<sup>th</sup> February, a platform for discussing modern day issues with religious significance. The topic for this year was "Family and Nation Building". The chief guest was Archbishop Felix Machado, Bishop of Vasai, who delivered the presidential address. The guest of honor was Dr. Maria Luisa Rossi, Secretary to Consul General of Italy in Mumbai, who delivered His Excellency Ugo Ciarlatani's message, and the keynote speaker was Dr. Rev. Fr. Rudolf C. Heredia, Founder of the Social Science Center at St. Xavier's College, Mumbai. Other dignitaries included, Fr. Cajetan D Menezes, Director of the Family Service Center Snehalaya, Dr. Astrid Lobo Gajiwala, Director of Tissue bank at Tata Memorial Hospital, Kapil Devdas, Vice President of ISKON Juhu, Mr. Irfan Engineer, Director of Center for Study of Society and Secularism Mumbai, who voiced their opinions and perspectives on the topic. Siddhanth Sinha (T.Y.B.Com) and Kelly Waller (T.Y.B.A) also participated in the panel discussion. The yearly journal was also released during the session entitled "Ethics and Society: An International Journal Religions and Cultures for Peace and Harmony"-Vol.5

Diploma Course: The diploma course on Religion, Society, Peace and Dialogue was initiated in 2014. This course has enabled students to gain an insight into the pluralism of India's religious diversity along with the teachings, customs, ethnicities, rituals and feasts and recent developments across several religions. It inculcates different values in students, the means to tolerate other religions, update their knowledge by working toward nation building and playing a transformational role to be ambassadors of peace in the national integration of the country. Dr. Vatika Sibal is the professor-in-charge of this course.

## **Student Outreach Programme**

S.Y.B.A. and S.Y.B.Com students of the Degree College had an Orientation about the Social Outreach Programme by our programme co-ordinator, Ms. Deepika Singh of the Institute for Community Organization Research, St. Pius Seminary, Goregaon. This year our students volunteered 20 hours of service in 24 centres such as Asha Kiran Community Centre, Cheshire Home, Navjeet Community Centre, Fatima Ashray for street girls, Ashankur Welfare Centre, Jeevan Asha Home for the aged, Shraddha Vihar, Stella Cancer Center, UMED, (Diocesan Small Scale Industry for Disabled) and Don Bosco Shelter. Some students also identified their own centres such as Little Angels Society for the Disabled, Bandra, and after securing approval, completed their 20 hours of service there.

Their social work included teaching and co-ordinating programmes with disadvantaged and special children, working in orphanages, assisting in aged homes, hospitals and NGO's working for environmental issues. At Juhu beach, co-ordinated by Ms. Deepika Singh, the students conducted a survey on cleanliness.

Many students forged bonds of friendship especially with the children they worked with and even decided to go back to these centres during their vacations. At the end of the academic year, students submitted a report of their experience along with their certificates. It is these

reports, in which students candidly share their views of the SOP programme, that the real value of the programme comes to light. One student spoke of the "deep compassion" she developed as a result of working with the aged. Another young man playing football with differently abled children never believed that he "was good with children". One group decided that they would continue to visit their centre after their exams as they had grown "fond of the children who look forward to our visits and we don't want them to feel that we are only coming to be with them because its compulsory. We want them to know that we really do care about them".

Once again, we express our heartfelt gratitude and congratulations to Bishop Allwyn D'Silva and many thanks to Ms. Deepika Singh and her team. We also thank the NGO's and institutions which welcome our students and support our outreach programme.

## Social Outreach Program – Self Financed Courses

The Social Outreach Program aims at encouraging students to start small good deeds while they contribute towards a better society. The Second Year students are placed in NGOs and special schools across the city where they dedicate 20 hours to doing their bit for the society. Our students were placed at various organizations, including Navjeet Community Center, Snehalaya Special School, ADAPT, Snehasadan, Sondbound, Atletico De Madrid Cooperation, Kingdom School, House of Charity, Young Women's Christian Association and Bless Foundation.

This year we aimed at effectively using the skills of our students while reaching out to the less-fortunate. A group of students conducted a week-long art workshop at Navjeet Society where teachers and children were taught to make canvas paintings, greeting cards, bookmarks and favors. One student (trained in Self defense) volunteered to train girls in Self Defense at Navjeet Society. A group of students willingly put their creative thoughts into action while they painted a Balwadi School at Bandra. Some musically inclined students trained children to sing at the NGO Songbound. The budding footballers of our college were selected by Atletico De Madrid Cooperation to train young children for football at BMC schools. Most of the students undertook teaching children as their social work and thoroughly enjoyed it.

Along with lifelong memories, this program created more awareness and realization among the students about the state of the society at large and how the little they did made a difference in the lives they touched. For some students the impact was such that they went beyond the 20 assigned hours and still continue to do so.

eClickZine, a photography event, in which only one participant per college was allowed, was conducted in two rounds. The first round required participants to submit 2-3 photographs of their choice which spoke about the ongoing events during Aura 2017 and the final round where qualifying participants were allowed to select any particular theme and submit three photos along with suitable quotes.

The "Business Model Show" required participant groups to come up with innovative business models for new ventures in various industries. "What's Your Say" -a debate competition and "Decisions"- a business quiz on the essential elements that help in conducting business in a better way were also held.

The CSR activity team of the fest visited slums in Mumbai and collected primary data on education, literacy, professional aspects, employment, health issues, skills etc. in order to find the gap between their education qualification and employment, their professional aspirations, the skills they possessed and how to enhance them, and how to tackle the various health issues they were facing. The data is currently being analyzed.

"Paint your Thoughts" - each participant had to paint their thoughts regarding a social problem on an A4 size paper. "Global Fushion" was a fashion show event that showcased the different world cultures and their fashion styles. "Happy Feet" brought dancers from all around the city to showcase their wonderful dance routines and talents from contemporary to hip hop and free style.

"Talent Hunt" allowed the youth of Mumbai to showcase their talents and blew the audience's minds with their singing, dancing, beat boxing, free style skills etc. There were games which revolved around the elective courses of management studies i.e. Human Resource, Marketing and Finance. There was "Game of Stocks" – a virtual mock stock in coordination with live trading, "Baazigar"– selecting companies from Nifty with risk levels, and "Think and Mint" – a KBC format of quiz competition

The games held for marketing were "Save Yourself"- where team participants had to

solve a locked room full of puzzles and tasks; "Top The Flop"- re branding failed products in the market and "AD MAD"- an ad related event which included quizzes and the showcasing of 2-minute ads by participants of every team with products allotted to them. The games held for human resources included "HR combat"- where participant's skills were tested in the field of industrial relations and "Magnetize"-an event that showcased participants' skills in employee engagement. #### National Service Scheme – NSS Motto: 'Not Me But You'

2016-17 was yet another fulfilling year for the NSS Unit of St. Andrew's College. Like every year we began with a congratulatory meeting of the volunteers who successfully completed one year with NSS during the previous year 2015-2016 by putting in 120 hours of dedicated social work. These enthusiastic volunteers fulfilled the cardinal principle of the programme: that it is organized by the students themselves to enhance their leadership qualities, democratic attitude, sense of civic responsibility and skills of team work & sharing responsibilities. Both the students and the professors-in-charge through their combined participation in social service get a sense of involvement in the tasks of community development. The activities undertaken during 2016-17 included:-

**Community/Area Based Activities:** Bandra Fair Security (11-18 September 2016): The NSS unit of St. Andrew's College assisted the police in providing security for all eight days at Mount Mary Church for the fair by helping the police in crowd management and arranging the devotees in queues to avoid any stampedes. Special assistance was extended to senior citizens, expectant mothers and small children in attending Mass at the Church. Snacks and water was also provided to them. We gave first-aid to people in need. Our volunteers frisked and checked people's bags to make sure no mishaps occured during the fair. The police officers as well as the officials of the Bandra Fair Committee appreciated our hard work, dedication and commitment.

Teaching at a Municipal School at Mira Road: After an initial orientation in our college

regarding the teaching activity, our volunteers were introduced to the Principal, teaching staff and non-teaching staff of the municipal school on the first day of their visit to the school. As there were some physically challenged students, they explained how to take care of them. We helped the teachers in preparing the teaching aids, craft, art making, and even gave an idea of digital teaching in all the class rooms. We taught English and prepared some activities to make their learning easier. We prepared the children for the Christmas day celebration by teaching them Carols with actions. On the last day we helped the teachers in preparing for Christmas day for the children. This activity made us aware of the importance of the right of education. We are grateful to have this beautiful opportunity to spread joy and cheer in the lives of young children.

Bandra Police Station (Bps) Activity: This activity was started in 2016 for the first time by the NSS Unit after the conclusion of the Bandra Fair Security Activity mentioned above. The Bandra Police noticed the excellent work done by our volunteers during the Bandra Fair and approached the NSS Unit through the Principal of our college for enlisting the volunteers' assistance at the BPS. The police taught us how to file missing reports and the different types of stamps used in the police station. They explained which legal documents should be taken to the Director General of Police and for what purpose and which legal documents were required for different permissions. We assisted the police by registering the names in the report book of all the people who entered the police station and helped the police understand the problems faced by the victims. They also told us which documents are required for passport verification and job verification. The police were very co-operative and supportive of our social work. The police station activity was a very enriching experience. We became aware of all the challenges and difficulties faced by the police which made us appreciative and grateful for the work that they are doing.

Energy Conservation Awareness: The Energy Conservation Project is an initiative by the University of Mumbai. The idea of the project was to sensitize the public about the need to conserve energy. The NSS volunteers were guided to carry out a survey of families in the locality, check the amount of electricity consumed and give them tips to conserve energy. A follow–up list was provided to students in order to note the information. The students then surveyed seven families for seven months from June to December and monitored their bills from time to time and gave them advice on how to conserve electricity by minimizing the use of electrical appliances that consume more watts, use of CFL bulbs instead of tube lights, etc. The families were than advised to switch off the lights and fans when not in use. Their doubts and queries were answered by the volunteers. The survey proved beneficial to many families as the volunteers helped convince them of the value of conserving energy for future needs.

#### Various Camps During The Year

Leadership Training Camp 2016: (5 Days Residential Camp - 9 August 2016 to 13 August 2016):The University of Mumbai National Service Scheme and MPV Valia College of Commerce jointly organized a residential Leadership Training Camp at the Teachers' Training Academy, University of Mumbai, Kalina Campus. Two of our F.Y. volunteers attended this camp. They had a great experience for five days with various informative sessions about NSS and general issues and many team building activities.

National Disaster Relief Force (NDRF) Training Camp: (5 Full Days Non Residential Camp -3 October 2016 to 7 October 2016): Two volunteers attended this camp organized by KES Shroff College in association with the University of Mumbai. They were trained by the NDRF team regarding what should be done in the event of a disaster. Sessions included rescuing people in danger with the help of ropes, action to be taken during a fire, building collapses, water rescues, snakes bites etc. What the volunteers liked the most was that these sessions were conducted by a highly trained and experienced team of the NDRF who had overcome such disaster situations many times in real life. Their expertise shone through and enhanced the value of the sessions.

University Level Camp: (7 Days Residential Camp – 9 January 2017 to 15 January 2017): One of our volunteers was selected for a University level camp from our college. It was organized by the NSS unit of ICS College, Khed. The theme of the camp was Swachhata Abhiyan. This rural residential camp was organized to train NSS volunteers from various colleges to stay together in a rural setting, acquire competence required for group living and sharing responsibilities with the main target of promoting and achieving a clean village.

Special Residential Rural Camp – (7 Days – 23 January 2017 To 29 January 2017): The much awaited NSS rural residential camp was held at Yusuf Meherally Centre, Tara Village, Panvel Taluka. Our adopted village, Koralwadi is located across a mountain and is a kilometre away from this campsite. 41 volunteers participated in the camp assisted by at least two/three professors at any point of time. The students provided community service in the adopted village such as cleaning the village, cleaning and painting the school building, and cleaning the area in front of the school. We arranged for the excavator to loosen the soil and to enable levelling of the ground in front of the school. Thereafter, the volunteers removed all the big stones and rocks from the dug up mud and manually levelled the ground with the help of simple equipment. The students also performed street plays for the residents of the near-by villages on social issues such as cleanliness, women's education, addiction, etc. Swachh Bharat Abhiyan was carried out at the campsite and also in the adopted village and students made the villagers aware about the importance of cleanliness. Flag hoisting was done on Republic Day at both the campsite and the adopted

village. Educational materials were also gifted to the children in the adopted village. A tribal girls' hostel was visited by our female volunteers who gifted them some educational materials and personal hygiene products. This interaction enriched each and every one's life who were present there. Our volunteers woke up early every morning for an exercise schedule and after breakfast some of the volunteers helped out daily in the kitchen with the cleaning and cutting of vegetables and preparation of food. Three guest sessions were held for the volunteers on topics such as Personality Development, Superstition, Street Play Skills, Relationship, and Gender Sensitivity.

Being away from our home and our families for seven days during the camp and also throughout the past one year, helped us become a new supportive family with our NSS team members. We learned qualities such as professional commitment, time management, empathy, tackling minor health issues, group-living, sharing our resources and talents selflessly, communications skills and so much more.

Our students displayed great enthusiasm and a sense of involvement to extend their services for community development. They worked hard and actively participated in each and every activity and fulfilled the NSS motto 'NOT ME, BUT YOU'.

# **Andrean Counseling Unit**

The Counseling Unit has been reaching out to students in need of any help, be it academics, developmental, emotional, behavioral, social or career related issues to help students

explore and reach their maximum potential leading to holistic development. This unit has offered its services to several students from the degree and junior college. This included new students walking in for guidance as well as students coming in for follow up sessions based on case requirements. The various issues experienced by students and adolescents were – low self-esteem and confidence, academic issues, career related guidance, behavioral issues, body image issues, interpersonal relationship, depression, time management, substance abuse, and so on.

These were addressed using counseling techniques like anger management, reality therapy, cognitive behavior therapy, client-centered therapy, assertiveness training, organizational skills – time management, positive thinking and relaxation techniques In some cases, standardized psychological tests and questionnaires were used to gain a greater insight and establish a scientific validation before providing the necessary guidance.

The counseling unit has gone beyond regular counseling services and carried out several activities for overall development of the students. A workshop on 'Developing Interview Skills' was conducted for the BBI students to learn how to thrive in the job market and to be productive members of society. Teaching interviewing skills helped students' communication (to express themselves verbally) and critical thinking abilities, setting them up for future success

A guest lecture by Dr. Rashna Sadri was organized on 'Exploring Careers in Special Education', a cross-disciplinary field. This talk gave students greater clarity about the field and exposed them to alternate career prospects. Various psychological tests were administered to students, and the interpretation of these tests helped students become aware of their strengths and weakness, their patterns of response, etc.. Some of the Standardized Psychological tests and scales administered to students were Emotional Quotient, Levels of Hostility, Depression, Self Esteem, and Type A Personality.

A workshop was conducted by Ms. Sneha Pareira on 'Test Anxiety, Time Management & Procrastination' and It was an interactive session using a power point presentation, drawing on the difficulties faced by students. The students of F.Y.B.A and S.Y.B.A attended the same. Eminent psychiatrist of Mumbai Dr. Harish Shetty writes a blog http://mindmoodsandmagic.blogspot.in which deals with issues concerning students, and reading these articles provides a psychological support to the students. Students are given regular updates and accessibility to the articles written.

## **Report of College Women Development Cell (CWDC)**

The University of Mumbai set up the University Women Development Cell (UWDC) in 2001 in response to the Vishaka judgment passed by the Supreme Court in 1997. The main objective of this cell is to make the University gender-sensitive. The College Women Development Cell (CWDC) is constituted as per the directive of the University of Mumbai. Its main objective is to sensitise students to issues related to gender with specific reference to sexual harassment. In accordance with the directive of UWDC, the CWDC constituted the Internal Complaints Committee as per the provisions of The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention Prohibition and Redressal) Act.

CWDC conducted various activities in the current academic year to make our campus gender sensitive. These included workshops, guest lectures, and screening of documentaries followed by discussions and deliberations.

**Workshops:** Prof. Vijendra from University Women Development Cell (UWDC) conducted a session on 'Sex Role and Gender Sensitisation' where he highlighted issues related to patriarchy resulting in a biased sex-role socialisation. He also conducted a session on 'Gender Discrimination' for the Self Finance Course students. Adv. Sonika Shetty conducted a workshop on 'Sexual Harassment and Legal Implication'. The sessions were based on the Vishaka guidelines on sexual harassment, rape, Article 498 a, 509 and marital rape.

**Guest Lectures:** Anson Thomas, an activist, shared his experience of being involved in rescuing minors from brothels in Mumbai. Aadesh Chavan from Yuvaa Aadhar, an NGO, conducted a workshop on 'Gender Relations'. Rinki Bhattacharya, activist and film maker, discussed issues related to physical and sexual abuse in marriage and relationships. Adv. Sonika Shetty conducted a workshop for students on sexual harassment at the work place.

**Street Plays:** The S.Y.B.B.I students enacted two skits on domestic violence and women's safety where they portrayed the pain and torture woman go through at every stage of lives and how they should stand up and fight for their rights.

Documentaries: The CWDC screened a series of documentaries pertaining to gender sensitisation since students are able to relate and participate in a more effective manner. This was followed by discussions and deliberation. Activists or social workers were called to give their views. Some of the prominent documentaries screened included BOL on gender discrimination, Born In Brothels-An Oscar winning documentary highlighting the challenge that women face when they are in the flesh trade, especially girls who are socialized to be future flesh trade workers, 'Water' which introspects into the tales of rural Indian widows in the 1940's and covers controversial subjects such as misogyny and ostracism, 'Parched' speaks on social evils and age-old traditions and practices of patriarchy, child marriage, dowry, marital rapes and women empowerment while 'Angry Indian Goddess' highlights and showcases numerous issues faced by residents of the country such as gender inequality, women as objectified sex objects, gay-straight friendships, big business vs. tribal rights, rape problem, caste differences, skin-color prejudice and lax justice, 'Behind Closed Doors' portrays the violence that women face behind closed doors in their respective families. The documentary teaches that women should not be treated as objects, and need to have an identity of their own

### A Report on Demonetisation

On 23 February 2017, a guest lecture organised by Dr Tavares helped us understand demonetisation from a banker's point of view. Mr Tushar Goyal and Mr Lokesh Bhatt, both bankers having over ten years of experience each, were able to cover an array of queries put before them.

They took us through the demonetisation of bank notes on two prior occasions—once in 1946 and then again in 1978—and in both cases, the goal was to combat tax evasion facilitated by "black money" held outside the formal economic system. In 1946, the preindependence government hoped demonetisation would penalise Indian businesses that were concealing the fortunes amassed from supplying the Allies in World War II. In 1978, the Janata Party coalition government demonetised banknotes of 1000, 5000 and 10,000 rupees in the hopes of curbing counterfeit money and black money.

On 8 November 2017, the current Prime Minister of India, Mr Narendra Modi, announced the government's plan for demonetisation in an unscheduled live televised address at 20:00 IST. In the announcement, Mr Modi declared that the use of all 500 and 1000 rupee banknotes of the Mahatma Gandhi Series would be invalid past midnight, and announced the issuance of new 500 and 2000 rupee bank notes of the Mahatma Gandhi New Series in exchange for the old bank notes.

In July 2010, the World Bank estimated the size of the shadow economy in India at 20.7% of the GDP in 1999, which then rose to 23.3% in 2007. In 2012, The Central Board of Direct Taxes recommended demonetisation in order to increase the percentage of tax payers (as reports suggested that only 41% of the population paid taxes in 2016), as well as to solve the problem of a parallel economy.

On 28 October 2016, the total number of banknotes in circulation in India was estimated at

approximately 17.77 trillion rupees worth. In terms of value, the annual report of Reserve Bank of India (RBI) generated on the 31<sup>st</sup> of March 2016 stated that the total bank notes in circulation were valued at approximately 16.42 trillion rupees, of which nearly 86% (around 14.18 trillion rupees were 500 and 1,000 rupee banknotes). In terms of volume, the report stated that 24% (around 22.03 billion) of the total 90,266 million banknotes were in circulation.

Of the notes demonetised in the form of the 500 and 1000 rupee bank notes of the Mahatma Gandhi Series, 9.2 trillion rupees in the form of 500 and 2000 rupee bank notes of the Mahatma Gandhi New Series have been re-circulated as of 10 January 2017, just two months after demonetisation was announced.

## 'How Google Changed the World' by Virginia Scott

There are many books that talk about the success of Google, but Virginia Scott's How Google Changed the World comprehensively answers all of these questions.

Scott is a freelance instructional designer for colleges, universities, and private companies, and has explained the journey and achievements of Google with great simplicity. Although the book was written in 2012, not much has changed for Google since then. It contains a chapter-wise explanation about the history and the success of Google while providing a frame of reference for the effects of changing technology as well.

Readers will be thrilled to know that Google started as a graduate school project with the primary aim of perfecting the method in which people searched for information on the World Wide Web. The book chronicles the entrepreneurs' controversial rise to fame and this journey through the web, which culminates at a point where Google is currently the most preferred search engine in the world and functions as a means of research, advertising, communication, and collaboration. Not only that, but a special section of the book reveals that Google has redefined the education sector and helped educators provide a better education to many students. This is not simply an achievement for Google, but is also a clear cultural shift in the field of education.

The book is thus invaluable to those interested in Google and how it became the most popular search engine on the internet despite never investing in advertising itself. Students with reports to write will appreciate the book's careful organisation as well as its moments of less formal and more conversational writing. Information Technology (IT) graduates or

people related to the IT industry will particularly enjoy reading this book as, although the book focuses on Google itself, it also contains various technical definitions and terms to add to the reader's knowledge base. The author has also added various conversations with lay people as well as interviews with experts in order to showcase not only the variety of questions that need to be asked, but also to provide an insider's perspective.

However, if a reader is interested in a quick history of Google, then Sara Gilbert's *The Story* of an excellent option. This book is much shorter, at only 65 pages, and a far quicker read than Scott's more elaborate overview. It's worth noting that although Scott delves into the history of Google's emergence in the tech sector and emphasises the way in which this has changed the manner in which we interact with the world, the sheer depth of her research can make the book seem a bit tedious. As a result, the book is best suited to students either interested in the history of the company or researching the topic for a case study.

All in all, the book is a treasure trove of valuable information. I would like to end with a phrase to keep in mind by Sergey Brin, one of the co-founders of Google: "Don't be afraid of failure. The more you stumble around, the more likely you are to stumble across something valuable."

#### Jallikattu

I felt it too petty a reason for thousands of people to physically gather in the name of a rural sport. So when I had the opportunity to go to Tamil Nadu, I talked to a few people, and heard what they had to say. They claim that Jallikattu was indeed their culture and tradition. And traditions do not just appear out of nowhere, they come about for a reason. It was a practice that helped choose the fittest candidate among bulls for breeding. While this was the underlying motive, over time it evolved into a stage for humans to showcase their own strength and incentives like bags of money (the very words it gets its name from.)

While PeTA claims that it is not a part of their culture, the widespread protests show that it was certainly not true (going by the dictionary meaning of culture: "the ideas, customs, and social behavior of a particular people or society.") Was it part of tradition? There is documented proof of it being practiced since 400-100 BC.

However, can culture or tradition alone trigger people to gather at the scale we saw? No, they say problem lies much deeper. There is little or no mention of this side of the story in mainstream media outside Tamil Nadu. The milk machines, the Jerseys, that produce up to forty liters of milk per day have put the local breeds who produce about ten liters, at risk of losing favor among farmers. While the milk production is higher, they claim that the quality is compromised on. Moreover, they feel that the dung produced by the Jerseys does not provide nutrients to fertilize the soil, pushing them toward chemical alternatives. The Jerseys have also pushed the local breeds into slaughterhouses where the farmer could earn more than what he would by selling its milk. Locals say that if Jallikattu is banned, it will be a severe setback for the already dwindling population of local breeds. So while PeTA may be concerned about the immediate harm done to animals it fails to see the long-term effects of the ban.

So then, we should ask if there are alternatives to Jallikattu. Yes, we are scientifically advanced enough to have our veterinarians tell us which bull is fit for breeding, through simple physiological tests. However, the alternative just remains on paper and no efforts are made to implement it, because the political parties are always looking to "milk the cow" and

convert the people's emotion into votes, our PM being no exception.

What then can be done? People are stuck between the views of an organization that views even the milking of cows as harassment, and political parties that keep them from the alternatives, exploiting their emotion in this matter. People don't really matter here, because the it is the court that has the power to decide. Banning a culture or tradition suddenly may upset the people who follow it, more so, with the lack of alternatives. However the wise thing would be to regulate these sports such that the animals are not tortured (intoxicating and hurting them can certainly be stopped), and in the meantime, introduce the alternatives gradually. Certainly we can move from 2500 year practices in this age of scientific discovery but to abruptly end something that has survived all these years would be unnatural. Slowly integrating new alternatives would be an ideal way to change ourselves.

## **Colours of the Cage: A Prison Memoir**

By Arun Ferreira Published by Aleph Book Company, September 2014

On 8 May 2007, a human rights activist, Arun Ferreira, was detained at Nagpur railway station. At midnight, eleven hours after his detention, he was taken to a police station and informed that he had been arrested under the Unlawful Activities (prevention) Act 2004 by the Nagpur police on suspicion of being a 'dreaded Naxalite.'

From 28 May to 14 June 2007, Ferreira was slapped with five more cases related to Naxalite violence in Gondia and Gadchiroli, which are districts in the states of Nagpur and Maharashtra respectively. The five new cases allowed the police to get Ferreira back into their custody for another four years and eight months.

Colours of the Cage is an account of the nearly five years that Ferreira spent in the most notorious prison in Maharashtra—the Nagpur Central Jail—during a time when he was implicated with false cases and fabricated evidence on charges such as criminal conspiracy, murder, possession of arms, and rioting, to name but a few. The memoir gives us an insight into Ferreira's life as a prisoner. It talks about the torture, the beatings, the harassment, the interrogation sessions, the tedious and tiring court procedures and hearings which he had to undergo. It provides details about the corrupt system, the codes of behaviour with the prisoners, the quality of food provided to them, various techniques used to extract false confessions which included sleep deprivation, tests for narcotics, painful bending and stretching positions, and more.

Ferreira, a graduate from the prestigious St. Xavier's College of Mumbai, who had been an activist since his student days, decided to do a post graduate programme in Human Rights from the Indian Institute of Human Rights, Delhi, by correspondence in 2008 while he was in prison, as his wife urged him to keep studying. Apart from completing his education, Ferreira also took up sketching while he was in prison, encouraged by his fellow inmates and political prisoners, leading him to become a cartoonist.

On 24 September 2011, the charges made against Ferreira were dismissed. On the morning of 27 September 2011, the day when Ferreira was to be finally released, a group of men in civil clothes pounced on him and he was abducted. Ferreira recounts how he could not see a glimpse of his family or the advocates who had come to receive him as they were made to stand beyond the outer wall of the prison. Ferreira was once again produced before a magistrate, who placed him back in him police custody, despite Ferreira complaining about his abduction and re-arrest. As a result, he was sent back to Nagpur prison.

Ferreira was crushed at the thought of having to run through the same cycle of torture, bail applications, and waiting endlessly for trial dates. In November 2011, Ferreira's dedicated team of lawyers in Mumbai, Nagpur, and Gadchiroli managed to sort through the colossal tangle of cases placed against him and got him a bail order; a result that, at the time, seemed impossible.

Finally, on 4 January 2012, Ferreira was to be released after his abduction and re-arrest. But the very idea of stepping out of the gate made him extremely nervous. He doubted whether his release would be a trouble-free one, especially considering what had happened earlier. With the help of his legal counsel and family, he finally walked out of the prison gate after four years and eight months finally as a free man.

Colours of the Cage is a real story about what goes on behind bars—the book is not only a tale of prison experiences, but also the story of a man's fight against the system for a more just society. It is about the triumph of the human will, the hope of breathing in free air, the zeal and the courage that he had in his heart, due to which he could spend four years and eight months in prison and emerge victorious with the hope of a corruption-free and a law-abiding society. A society which, he hopes, grants freedom of speech, expression, and thoughts and where becoming an activist will not lead to endless days and years in prison.

# **Deciphering Demonetization**

The impact of the Indian government's announcement, stripping the existing 500 and 1000 Rupee notes of their validity as legal tender was tremendous - both economically and in the lives of the Indian people. The Prime Minister, in his address on 8th November, 2016 had rightly cited corruption, black money and terrorism as valid threats against the Indian democracy and he subsequently announced demonetization as a solution. He also explained the need for secrecy as public awareness of the move would have proved to be counterproductive. However, following Prime Minister Narendra Modi's announcement, the country was brought to a standstill. The following weeks exhibited both the lack of planning on the part of the government and the resilience of the people of the country. The move caught the banking sector by surprise, and the RBI did not have adequate new printed notes to replace the old notes which were being brought out of circulation. The following weeks saw severe inconvenience caused to the people and numerous changes in the standpoint of the government on the issue of demonetization.

The failure in planning by the higher echelons of the government was markedly exhibited. Firstly, there was a severe underestimation of the number of newly printed notes which would be required. Secondly, the government failed to anticipate that the newly printed notes, being of different dimensions would require the ATMs to be recalibrated in order to be functional. Thirdly, despite the government's assurance that hospitals, fuel stations and other emergency services would continue to accept the demonetized notes, citizens across the country complained about the failure to ensure these services followed government stipulations. In addition, in the midst of the growing commotion in the government in the immediate aftermath of the announcement, different opinions were voiced by different leaders, exhibiting a clear lack of communication. Most interesting, however, was the sudden pivot by the government, including the Prime Minister, who had originally spoken of demonetization as the solution to black money and corruption to demonetization being the first step to a 'cash-less economy. Even the press release after the Prime Minister's first announcement stressed the need to remove corruption and black money. After a few weeks, the pitch slowly changed from removing corruption to a cashless economy.

The legality of the move was also questionable as no Parliamentary Act was passed, and neither was a government Ordinance issued before the move was implemented. It was only on 28 December that the Specified Bank Notes (Cessation of Liabilities) Ordinance, 2016 was issued and penal clauses were laid out for those found to continue transacting with old notes. On the contrary, the previous exercise at demonetization in 1978 was done by law with the High Denomination Bank Notes (Demonetization) Act, 1978. In addition, several citizens approached the High Courts of several states and the Supreme Court to stay the move and/or declare it unconstitutional. In particular contention was the government's decision to set a withdrawal limit on the money which could be withdrawn per week, and whether it was a violation of the Fundamental Right to Property, as specified by the Constitution of India. Though the apex court refused to stay the move, it also criticized the

government for its failure to plan properly, as stating that "surgical strikes should not be performed against the citizens of the country."

While supporters and detractors of the move are numerous, the real impact of the move remains to be seen. Although there has been a rapid influx of money into the formal banking sector, the simultaneous discovery of stashes of money worth several lakhs and crores in new notes in different parts of the country (while withdrawl limits were still in place) raised the question of how effective this move has been in curbing the menace of black money and corruption. In addition, the severe jolt on the informal sector cannot be overlooked. The agricultural sector in particular has been adversely affected, especially as the demonetization drive coincided with the sowing season for the rabi crop. The ambiguity about the effect of demonetization will have on the GDP remains, with varying opinions from noted economic experts on both sides. The long term implications of the move are yet to be seen and the next few months will show how the move has impacted the country and the economy.

### Industrial visit to Alf Engineering: A Report

On 30<sup>th</sup> August 2016, the department of B.Sc- Information Technology had organized an industrial visit for the students of the second and the third year . We were accompanied by two of the faculties of the department. The visit was to the Alf Engineering Plant, situated in Nashik, Maharashtra. Alf engineering is a company which deals with the manufacture of automotive Chassis, and manufactures over 1200 frames/day from its plants across India.

The visit started in the early hours of a college working day. On reaching the plant we were greeted by the Manager, Mr. Ramesh Nair. We were divided in two groups. The first group was taken to the conference room and a brief over view of what the company was about, how they function and their take on information technology was presented to us. It was a very interactive session. Later we were divided into 3 groups and Mr. Ashwin D'Souza, Mr.Rajeev D'Souza and Ms. Malaika D'Souza took us to the plant and briefed us about the plant as well as the number of production lines. He also answered the queries of the students regarding marketing and manufacturing. They later took us to two other plants of their own. नारी शक्ति स्वरूपा है। वह उत्साह का अमर स्त्रोत है जहाँ से पुरूष को दिव्य विजय पताका फहराने की प्रेरणा-शक्ति प्राप्त होती है। वात्सलमयी, गौरवशालिनी, त्यागमयी, उत्सर्गमयी, क्षमाशील, करूणामयी, कोमलांगी एवं सौन्दर्यशील नारी विविध रूपों में अनन्तकाल से साहित्य का प्रमुख विषय रही है। पौराणिक काल को जहाँ नारी के पतन मध्ययुग में अपनी अन्तिम साँसे गिन रहा था। मध्यकाल में अनेक कुप्रथाओं के विकास से नारी को जीवन की अत्याधिक दुर्दशा हुई। इस काल में नारी अनेक कुप्रथाओं जैसे अशिक्षा, बाल-विवाह बाधित वैधव्य, सती-प्रथा, बहुपत्नी आदि की सर्वाधिक शिकार हुई। अभिभावकगण अपनी कन्या का विवाह अल्पायु में ही दहेज की समस्या से बचने हेतु जैसा भी वर मिले, उससे कर देते थे। इस कुप्रथा के फलस्वरूप नारी को बाल-विवाह एवं असमय में वैधव्य जीवन व्यतीत करने के लिए विवश होना पडा। नारी जीवन से सम्बन्धित इन सामाजिक कुरोतियों का प्रभाव आज भी कम नही हैं। समाज में नारी कई रूपों में पाई जाती थी। तथा नर्तकी, वेश्या, गणिका, रूपजीवा, सामान्य अथवा देवदासी आदि। इनका कार्य दूर वस्तियों में पर-पुरुषों का आमोद-प्रमोद करना और उनसे धन लेकर ऐश्वर्यशाली जीवन जीना था। इनकी अपेक्षा कुल-ललनओं पर कर्तव्य धर्म तथा सामाजिक मर्यादा का विशेष नियंत्रण रहता था। वैदिक काल से आधुनिक काल तक आते-आते नारी जीवन का इतिहास वेदना विगलित हृदय का दस्तावेज बनकर रह गया। सन १८८८५ में भारतीय राष्ट्रीय कॉग्रेस की स्थापना पश्चात केशवचंन्द्र सेन, महर्षि कर्वे तथा गांधीजी आदि महापुरूषों के अथक प्रयत्नों से चारदिवारी के भीतर कैद नारी ने प्रभामंडित शैक्षिक जगत में प्रवेश किया। नारियों में साक्षरता का प्रसार करने के लिए सर्वप्रथम कलकता में सन १८४७७ में महिला

महाविद्यालय की स्थापना हुई। इसी कॉलेज की स्थापना के साथ भारतीय महिलाओं के लिए आधुनिक शिक्षा के द्वार खुले।

इस प्रकार स्पष्ट है कि सृष्टि के प्रारंभ से लेकर अब तक नारी पुरूष के जीवन की उन्नायक एवं पोषक रही है। सभी युगो में विश्व रंगमंच पर नारी कभी पुरूष की देवी रही, तो कभी चरणों की दासी, कभी आराध्या रही तो कभी सेविका कभी गृहस्वामिनी रही तो कभी वन्दिनी रही है, किन्तु आधुनिक समाज में शिक्षा के प्रचार-प्रसार से सामाजिक मूल्यों में बदलाव से तथा पाश्चात्य सभ्यता के प्रभावस्वरूप नारी की सामाजिक स्थिति पहले से काफी बेहतर हुई है। समाज में नारी के स्वरूप को अंकित करते हुए उसके बदलते हुए जीवन मूल्यों का चित्रण किया है।

विभिन्नतेतही एकता कशी नांदते हे सणांतून आपल्याला कळून येते. चैत्र गौरीचा स्वागताचे दिवस म्हणजे हळदी कुंकूचे सण. हा स्त्रियांचा सण म्हणून जाणवलं जात. हा उपक्रम गावाखेड्यात स्त्रियांना एकत्र येण्यासाठी एक साधन असते. जेव्हा सगळीकडे हिरवळ असते. श्रावणातले सण संपत आलेले असतात व एकूण आनंदाचे वातावरण असते तेव्हा पोळा हा सण साजरा करण्यात येते. बैलांचा थाट असतो व शेतकऱ्यांना कामापासून आराम असतो. हा सण शेतकऱ्यांचा म्हणून प्रसिदध आहे. शेती केल्याबद्दल त्यांचा आभार मानायचा दिवस असतो. नाग राजाचा मान ठेवायला शिवशंकर भोले देवाची पूजा अर्चना करून नागांचे रक्षण करायला नागपंचमीचा सोहळा साजरा केला जातो. निसर्गाशी जनन करून वसंत ऋतुच्या आगमनीचा हा पर्व आहे.

प्रत्येक सण साजरा करण्याचा, धार्मिक मुळ कारण असते पण संकुचितपमा, भेदाभेद, अपराभव असल्यामुळे काही सण त्रासदायकही वाटतात म्हणून आपण कधी सण साजरे करायचे मुळ कारण विसरायचे नाही.

प्रत्येक सण साजरा करायचा प्रकार ही विविध असतो. गुढी पाढवा दिनदर्शिका प्रमाणे चैत्र शुद्ध प्रतिपदेला साजरा केला जातो. हिंदू वर्षातील हा पहिला दिवस आहे. गुढी उंच बांबूवर बांधली जाते. बांबूच्या एका टोकाला रेशमी कापड, कडुनिंब, फुलांचा हार आणि साखरेची माळ बांधून त्यांवर तांब्या बसवला जातो. गुढी हे स्वागताचे प्रतीक आहे.

विविध सण हे साजरे केले जातात. होळीच्या दिवशी गुझिया (करंजी), दिवळीत बर्फी, पेढे, लाडू, शीरा इ. स्वयपांक बनवले जातात. गणेशोत्सवाचे मोदक तर सर्वांना आवडतात. मकरसंक्रातीचा सण महाराष्ट्रातील बऱ्यापैकी साजरा होतो. त्या दिवशी तर तिळाचे लाडू देऊन एकमेकांना गोड गोड बोलन्याची शुभेच्छा पण देतात.

सणांचा मुळ उपदेश लोकांना एकत्रित करून देवाला धन्यवाद देण्याची आहे. म्हणून लोकमान्य टिळकांनी गणेशोत्सवाच्या माध्यमातून लोकांना स्वतंत्र्याची लढा देण्याची बातमी केली पण काही सणांना नकोसे पद्धत उपक्रम लाभले

आहेत. आपण आपल्या मनातले संकुचितपणा त्यागून एकत्रितपणे सण साजरा करायचे व सणांचा मूळ उद्देश मनात ठेवून सणांचा आनंद घ्यायचा. कोणत्याही जाती जमातीच्या धर्माच्या स्त्री पुरूषांच्या मध्ये भेदाभेद करायचा नाही. आपण आपले सण समाजाच्या सर्व लोकाबरोबर साजरा करायचे म्हणजे आई वडिल नसलेले मुले, विधवाबरोबर पण साजरा करायचा. म्हणजे माणूस हीच जात, हाच धर्म ही लक्ष मनात जागे असायचे. आपलं गाव, शेतकरी,घर व देवाचे आभार मानायला समर्पण ठेवावे.

रंग होळीचा, दसरा विजयाचा, सण हे नवेजुणी विसरून फक्त आनंद वाटण्या हृदय प्रेमांचा, रूप स्नेहांचा वाणी नात्यांचा, वेश बंधाचा पर्व हर्षाचा, जीवनात उल्हासाचा प्रत्येक दिवस आहे, एका नव्या उत्सवाचा

# गणेशोत्सव

महाराष्ट्रात शंभराहून अधिक वर्षे गणोशोत्सव साजरा केला जातो. समाजाची सर्वागिण उन्नती आणि प्रगती साधण्याचे एक साधन म्हणून सार्वजनिक गणेशोत्सवाला प्रारंभ करण्यात आला. बदललेल्या जगरहाटीच्या अपरिहार्य परिणाम म्हणून लोकमान्य टिळकांनी सुरू केलेल्या या गणेशोत्सवाच्या चेहरामोहरा आता पूर्णपणे बदलला आहे.

स्वातंत्र्यपुर्व काळात ब्रिटिश सरकारने सार्वजनिक सभा आणि लोकांच्या एकत्र येण्यावर बंदी घातली होती आणि जनजागृतीसाठी लोकांना एकत्र आणणे अत्यंत गरजेचे होते. देशाला स्वातंत्र मिळवुन देण्याच्या विचाराने लोकमान्य टिळक भारले होते. लोकांना एकत्र कसे आणता येईल याचा विचार करत गिरगाव चौपाटी वर समुद्र किनारी बसल्या बसल्या ते वाळूपासून मुर्त्या बनवत आणि त्या मुर्त्या पाहायला लोक जमा होत असत. त्या मुर्त्यांना पाहिल्यावर लोकांच्या येणाऱ्या प्रतिक्रियांवरून टिळकांच्या असे लक्षात आले की भारतीय लोक हे अत्यंत श्रद्धाळु आणि ईश्वराला घाबरणारे आहेत.

देव आणि धार्मिक भावनांचा भारतीय जनमानसाच्या मनावर एवढा जबरदस्त पगडा आहे की धार्मिक कार्यासाठी आपापसातील हेवे-दावे आणि वैर विसरून ते एकत्र येतात. यामुळे टिळकांच्या मनात विखुरलेल्या जनतेला एकत्र बांधण्यासाठी एक आशेचा किरण निर्माण झाला. धार्मिक कारणासाठी लोकाच्या एकत्र येण्याला ब्रिटिश सरकार विरोध करू शकनार नाही हे लोकमान्य टिळकांनी ओळखले आणि त्यातुनच गणेशोत्सवाला सार्वजनिक रूप द्यायची कल्पना त्यांच्या मनात आली.

पुढे भाऊसाहेब लक्ष्मण जावळे यांनी १८९२ साली भाऊसाहेब रंगारी गणपती, बुधवार पेठ या नावाने सर्वप्रथम गणपतीच्या मुर्तीची स्थापना करून पुण्यात सार्वजनिक गणेशोत्सवाची मुहूर्तमेढ रोवली, सार्वजनिक गणेशोत्सव सुरू करण्याविषयीची पहिली बैठक भाऊसाहेब लक्ष्मण जावळे यांच्या अध्यक्षतेखाली बुधवार पेठ, पुणे येथील त्यांच्या निवासस्थानी घेतली गेली. ज्याला भाऊ रंगारी भवन म्हणून ओळखले जाते.

मुख्यतः महाराष्ट्रात साजरा होणारा गणेशोत्सव हा खऱ्या अर्थाने सार्वजनिक म्हणता येईल. सर्व भाषिक एकत्र येऊन हा सण उत्साहात साजरा करताना आपण पाहतो गणपती जवळ आले ही जाणीव नेहमीच सगळ्यांसाठी उत्साहाची असते. अशा उत्सवांमार्फतच एकजूटीची, एकसंघपणाची भावना वाढीस लागत असते. लोक हा गणेशोत्सव उत्साहाने आणि आवडीने साजरा करतात.

गणपती दशदिशांचा स्वामी आहे. दशदिशा म्हणजे अष्टदिशा अधिक उध्व (वरची) आणि अधर (खालची) अशा दोन दिशा. कोणतेही मंगलकार्य किंवा इतर कोणत्याही देवतेची पूजा करताना प्रथम गणपतीपूजन करतात. गणपतिच्या पूजेत लाल वस्त्र जास्वंदीसारखे लाल फूल, रक्तचंदन यासारख्या लाल वस्तू वापरणे फार महत्वाचे असते याचे कारण म्हणजे गणपतीचा वर्ण लाल आहे. पूजेत वापरलेल्या वस्तूंच्चया लाल रंगामुळे गणेशाचे तत्व मूर्तीकडे जास्त प्रमाणात आकृष्ट होते व त्यामुळे मूर्ती जागृत व्हायला मदत होते.

मुंबईतला पहिला गणेशोत्सव गिरगावात केशवजी नाईकाच्या चाळीत सुरू केला जिथे गणेशाच आगमन विसर्जन अजूनही लेझिम घेऊन वाजत गाजत होत असते. पण आजुबाजूच्या कर्णकर्कश आवाजात अशा मिरवणूका हरवून जात असतात. ह्याच काही ठिकाणी नामवतांची वेगवेगळ्या विषयांवर व्याख्यानमाला वर्षभर राबवली जात ज्याने जनजागृती होण्यास मदत होत असे शिवाय काही आदर्शही समाजापुढे ह्यानिमित्ताने येत असत.वेळात वेळ काढून साजरे करत असतो तसाच वेळ प्रत्येकाने जर इथे दिला तर अनेक उपक्रम राबवले जाऊ शकतात.

विविध आकारातील, रूपातील, संगतीचा मेळ साधणाऱ्या अशा भक्तांच्या मागणीनुसार बापाच्या प्रतिमा तयार होतात. आगमनाची चाहूल, तर घरोघरी सफाई करण्यापासून पाहुण्यांच्या संख्येला अंदात घेण्यापर्यंतच्या तयारीत गणेशभक्तही तल्लीन होतो. घरी आलेल्या बाप्पाचे मनोभावे कौतुक करताना त्याच्या सहवासातील हा अकरावा दिवस कधी उजाडतो समजतच नाही तो घरी येणार ही जाणीव जितकी सुखदायक तितकीच तो आता परतणार ही भावना नकोशी वाटते. प्रसन्न वातावरण निर्माण करणाऱ्या लंबोदराचे विसर्जन करताना डोळ्यांत पाणी तरळते व मन बाप्पा पुढल्या वर्षी लवकर ये असे हक्काने म्हणते आणि बाप्पा देखील दरवर्षी उत्साहाचं गाठोडं घेऊन येतो.

ह्या आणि अशा अनेक गोष्टीमुळे पूर्वी गणेशोत्सव गाजत असतं. हल्ली वेळेचा अभाव असला तरी गणेशोत्सवाकडे पाहण्याचा दृष्टिकोनही बदलल्यामुळे त्यात कृत्रिमपणा आलाय. वर्षभर आपण अनेक मॉडर्न गोष्टीसाठी ज्यात वेगवेगळे डेज Sr. Sophiya Lemos (Std F.Y.B.A. - A) Roll.No. 56
