The Cardinal Paul Poupard Foundation has been constituted under Italian law and recognized by the Republic of Italy. The Foundation intends to conserve and make use of the considerable patrimony of cultures and relationships that the Cardinal created over many years, in seeking to promote and encourage cultural initiatives that can foster the coming together and understanding between religions and cultures all over the world. It seeks to promote Congresses, Conferences and Publications, to create Chairs in Universities throughout the world, so as to help students with grants, and to promote 'The Dialogue of Cultures'.

In a constantly changing world where intolerance and impatience have become the watchwords, it is increasingly necessary that concrete steps be taken to create and change the thinking of a generation born to violence and strife, whether real or witnessed, in the daily news and present day cinema. At time like this, as often seen in history, it is the religious institutions which are in the best position to bring about change. Archbishop Machado remarked "...the church is convinced that war creates more problems than it solves; that dialogue is the only just and noble path to agreement and reconciliation, and that the patient and wise art of peace-making is especially blessed by God."

We express our gratitude to Archbishop Machado and Cardinal Gracias for being instrumental in obtaining the Chair and establishing it at St Andrew's College. It is the first time ever that a college in India has been given this privilege.

Religious conflict in Iraq and Syria

Religion - is a word that many dwell upon. It is something perceived by many as a way of communicating with the creator, as a way of being accepted in society, and as a hope for survival during times of distress and sorrow. Religion is that elixir of life that sustains people in order to live in peace, harmony, mutual understanding and coexistence. However, religion has been the major cause of some of the worst conflicts in the history of mankind. It has caused destruction to life and property to such an extent that it cannot be explained. There have been many conflicts arising out of the very same religion we all supposedly take great efforts to protect. But now knowing the sentiments of the people belonging to other faiths that surround us, we always tend to stereotype people and religion, which is one of the reasons of religious conflict. Whether it was the war by the Crusades (1095-1291), the Lebanese-civil war (1975-1990), the Israel-Palestine conflict, or the India-Pakistan conflict - all of these huge uprisings were caused because of religion so to say 'protection of one's religion.' And it is not new that the recent conflict on religion especially on religious minorities is taking place in Iraq and Syria by religious fanatics the ISIS (The Islamic State of Iraq and Syria).

Not going much into detail, the major conflict that led to the devastation and destruction of property and loss of countless civilians was mainly because of terrorist groups who aimed at creating a fully developed Muslim state known as the Islamic State (IS). They attacked the Syrian army and took control over the military power like death on swift wings. They approached and attacked in hundreds mercilessly, beheading hundreds of soldiers to create an unpleasant environment of shock and fear among the civilians. Their basic mottos is - Either convert to Islam, or pay non-Muslim tax, or die! This shocking, yet horrifying mass conversion led to thousands lying dead as they were beheaded in front of their families - kids as young as 7 and 8 were sacrificed in the name of religion. Due to this, thousands of religious minorities namely the Syrian Christians and the Kurdish Christians fled away in the desert only to be caught by sweltering heat of the sun. Sooner or later they perished one by one!

The members of the jihadist group ISIS enforced the Sharia law upon all civilians in order to lead a life of discipline and justice. This was seen as an act of valor among these religious fanatics as they often neglected their own families and was ever ready to doe in the name of God. The law also kept into account drinking habits, economic affairs in the country, and crime and punishment where the accused are often beaten, scourged, killed on a cross in public, or even beheaded in extreme cases. Houses were ravaged, churches were destroyed completely, cross and other religious monuments were uprooted from its very foundation and in place of it, the members of IS established teaching centers where they teach young kids the meaning of true Islam and Jihad.

Many say that the reason for this widespread uproar has been religion. However, that is not it. The major reason has been US' invasion on the Muslim lands especially after 9/11. The situation post 9/11 (War on Terror) took a turn for the worse and failed in some areas. The constant breach on Muslim lands by western countries namely the USA and countries in Europe and America's failed foreign policy on Iraq and Syria were some of the untold causes that led to the Iraqi-Syrian conflict that we see today. Media officials have hidden much of the untold story. The reason being that wealthy oil-rich countries that predominantly exhibit Wahhabism fund the well-known media companies. This is part and parcel of what we call politics and geo-politics. The ongoing humanitarian crisis has led to various Human Rights violations and several countries have condemned ISIS as barbaric in nature. The United Nations relief and aid programs have helped most of the surviving minorities, but the question remains is this "How many more conflicts based on Religion are we going to witness in the near future?" "How long will political and influential people misuse their power to change the status quo?" "When will the world realize that we all are a part of a global family irrespective of religion, caste, and creed?" We need to think about it as human beings, as brothers and sisters of one global family.

I would like to conclude by saying that let all feet walk to the Mount in the journey to experience peace and harmony. Let this beautiful shrine 'The queen of the suburbs' be a symbol of love, peace and unity not only to the people of Mumbai but also to the firm believers and devotees of the Holy Mother who in turn leads them all to Her son Jesus Christ. Life after Death- An Inter-Religious Perspective

"Now I have become Death, the Destroyer of Worlds". These words of ten echoes in the minds and hearts of practically all men and women on earth since time immortal, causing fear, distress panic and worry.

I am reminded of a Chinese legend which revolves around the life of an ancient monarch of the Orient. He had an ambition to write all China under one throne, a dream which he later fulfilled. He brutally executed all his opponents. But he could not withstand his last opponent –Hades. And so he lived and so he died, his body reduced to ashes; his empire scattered among the greedy barons and earls. Death befalls both the prince and the pauper, golden thrones and wooden chairs, alike. No living thing can escape the Grim Reopet; he simply takes what is rightly fully his. So, it is safe to conclude that life and death are two sides of the same coin, very much like the Yin and Yang of the Chinese inhabitants.

All religions are basically methods promulgated to live a better life. It is but natural for saints and sages to comment on death. Research has proved that there are two aspects of death-oblivion and afterlife.

The afterlife is not a new concept. It was first used by the ancient Egyptians. They believed in 'Ka' (body) and 'Ba'(Soul). When the 'Ka' perished the 'Ba' lived on to meet Orisis, the God of the Underworld.

In all religions, there are central figures that represent the afterlife or the life after death. Here after Hinduism mentions Yamraj, Greeks had an idea of Hades with his Roman Counterpart-Pluto and the American pop culture has a skeleton with a Sycthe for harvesting souls.

There are two basic schools of thought on the afterlife-A = Eternal Rest and the other, B = Reincarnation or Rebirth.

Christianity, Islam and certain Jewish groups (save the Sadducees' sect) believe that once a person passes away, his soul will be judged and will be assigned either to Paradise or to Eternal Damnation. The Catholic Church has a teaching discourse that states that a soul of a person who died in communion with God will be first purified in purgatory and will be welcomed into Heaven. Hell is not a punishment rather it is a self excuse or rejection of the love of God. Islam preaches that all souls will be judged on Last Day and the Creator will see all things, good and bad, virtue and vice together. Some followers of Judaism, too, trust in the concept of paradise.

In addition to this, there are certain mystic or esoteric faiths where rebirth is a doctrine. For example: Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism and so on. Here the concepts of Dharma and Karma play vital roles. In esoteric Tibet, the Dalai Lama is considered to be the reincarnation of his very first predcessor.

Also, there are certain individuals like atheists, agnostics and others who preach that death is final. All processes end at the last breath is their dogma.

Regardless of the last category mentioned above, nearly all persons are afraid of death and here religion plays a huge role in soothing and calming. I am reminded of the message that the Catholic cleric solemnly states while he imposes the ashes on the foreheads of his faithful congregation at his church on Ash Wednesday- 'Dust thou art, and to dust thou shall return'. Life and death are two parallel processes which cannot be separated at all. All we can do is remember Russell Crowes famous dialogue in the Oscar —winning film Gladiator- "Death smiles at all men all a man can do is smile back".


