Criteria 1: Curriculum Planning and Implementation

- To report on the outcomes of:
- Co-curricular activities related to Gender, Environment, Human Values, Professional <u>Ethics and Value Added courses:</u> Dr. V. Sibal outlined programmes conducted by the <u>English</u>, Psychology, History and Sociology Departments with their corresponding learning outcomes. She also listed such activities that were held by the UNESCO CPPC Diploma Course, Andrean PR Team, Andrean Students' League, Nature Club, DLLE

and Life Skills. Please see details in Criteria 1 report attached. In future, all departments/associations are requested to reword their learning outcomes suitably. For TYBA/BCom Value Education another teacher-in-charge is to be appointed to replace Vinita Fernandes. For proofs of activities, signatures of students are required as attendance, accompanied by the professor's signature. Photograph proofs to be geotagged.

- 2. <u>Measures taken to go beyond the syllabus:</u> Dr. V. Sibal outlined the initiatives taken by the Sociology Department, Competitive Exam Committee, UNESCO and CPPC, CWDC and the Research Committee. For details, see Criteria 1 report attached
- It was decided that for Syllabus planning and completion, Department heads should collect and combine all department members' documents and submit them to the Criteria head as a single pdf document.

Criteria 2: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

- To report on outcomes of:
 - 1. Workshops, conferences, seminars organised by departments; Ms. V. Nair submitted a table detailing the above held by the different departments. (See Appendix A)
 - 2. Mechanism/measures taken to ensure regular attendance among students and to reduce failures in examinations: Attendance defaulters of term 2 (November-December 2023) were asked to write answers to 5 questions set by the respective subject teachers on the syllabus completed until date. Details of students who complied are Appendix B. Grade card distribution of Semester I and III were done with the parents present so that they are made aware of their ward's performance. ATKT students were asked to solve and submit 2 sets of previous ATKT papers as practice. Details of those who complied are in Appendix B.

- Regarding Attendance statistics by Onfees, Drs. J Bhatia and S. Gonsalves stated that there were mistakes in the calculation. It was decided that Mr. Abhishek would share his practice of using Google sheets to maintain attendance and perhaps that method can be explored to eliminate errors in the system.
- January 2024 attendance defaulters will be warned in February 2024 and asked to make up their attendance.
- The IQAC suggested that while setting question papers, staff members need to set varying levels of questions to cater to students abilities and also encourage general knowledge and current affairs. As far as possible the text-book culture needs to be eliminated, beginning with the staff themselves.
- It was suggested that errors in the attendance system should be completely eliminated by June. Thus next academic year, students defaulting in attendance will be debarred from appearing for regular Semester I and Semester III examinations. Instead, once their attendance improves a separate Semester I and Semester III Examinations will be held at a later date. Debarring them from the

- regular examinations should act as a deterrent to poor attendance but the students will not lose the year.
- Orientation signatures of parents and students, agreeing to the attendance rules, should be systematically maintained.
- 3. Mentoring plan undertaken and the progress to mentor students: Mentoring is ongoing by class teachers assigned to each division. 24 January was suggested as a 'mentoring day'. However, staff said that syllabus completion was priority in this short second term, hence teachers would continue to mentor students around the time table schedule.
- 4. <u>Usage of online resources by students</u>: Dr. S. Rajpurkar, the Librarian, reported that there were 220 logins with 551 pages viewed for the online resources.
- To report on outcomes of
 - 1. TY Semester VI examination results for 2022-23: Ms. V.Nair presented the exam statistics for Sem VI. Please see the Criteria 2 report attached.
 - 2. FY Semester I & SY III and TY Semester V examination results for 2023-24: Were also presented in tabular form by Ms. V. Nair. Please see Criteria 2 report attached.

Criteria 3: Research, Innovation and Extension

- To report on outcomes of:
 - 1. Extension activities organised in neighbourhood locality by NSS & DLLE: Dr. P. Shahi provided a tabular report of the NSS Activities from June 2023 to mid-January 2024 and a pdf document of DLLE activities. See Criteria 3 report attached for details.

- 2. <u>Innovation activities undertaken for ecosystem</u>: Dr. P. Shahi reported on the activities of the Andrean Entrepreneurship and Incubation Cell's Technical training sessions, student businesses and the Commerce department's Skill Development Course on Social Media Marketing. She also reported on the Art Therapy and Colour Psychology Workshop.
- 3. Activities organised by research cell specifically with reference to Aaviskar: Dr. P. Shahi provided a detailed report of the Aavishkar Research Programme, including students and their topics at the college, Inter-college and Zonal rounds. Please see Criteria 3 report for details

Criterion 4-Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- To report on:
 - 1. Cleaning, repair and maintenance of classrooms, roof & staff washrooms: Mr. A. Sood reported that regular cleaning of classrooms is being carried out. The repair of the 4th floor classrooms is almost complete with only minor POP work pending in L1 and L2 due to supply shortage of material. The 4th floor roof has been replaced by a new one. With regards to the washrooms, one flush and one tap of the Ladies bathroom on the first floor requires replacing, only two stalls are completely usable. The 2nd floor Ladies washroom also has drainage issues to be sorted out. The water tap in the first floor staff gents washroom is still leaking inspite of several reminders

by C.A.K. Miranda. With regards to the staff gents washroom on the 4th floor - it is completely unusable. Thus all male staff members share one single washroom on the first floor. Mr. Sood suggested a portion of the 2nd floor boys washroom could be altered into a staff washroom.

- The IQAC suggested asking the Management for a working monthly budget of about Rs 5000 which could be used by the Registrar for minor repairs such as the taps etc, thus avoiding the long drawn out process of seeking tenders etc for such minor works.
- 2. Follow-up maintenance of classrooms projectors: Mr. A. Sood provided details of the AMC contract for the projectors that has expired. Mr. Damodar and Mr. Linus confirmed that new tenders have been invited. Mr. Sood reiterated that some LCD's need replacement and some HDMI connections are missing in some classroom projectors.
 - 3. To suggest measures to deal with pigeon menace/nuisance: Mr. Sood suggested netting should be done universally across the entire building. There are gaps near the 3rd floor staffroom, F7, F8 and the laboratories. Netting quality should be imporved and peons need to ensure that classroom windows are closed at the end of the lectures.
- 4. To give update on
 - 1. Facilities in gymkhana: No data given
 - 2. <u>Library as a learning resource</u>: The Library conducted a Slogan Writing Competition and Book Review Competition. These were appreciated by the IQAC. The new RFID gates have also been installed at the Library entrance and will be activated soon. Mr. Sood gave details of 5 new journals and 1 newspaper that have been added to the subscription list (see Criteria 4 report attached for details). Book bank service was extended to 62 students and 257 books were added to the collection.

- Challenges: Mr. A. Sood pointed out that discussion areas for students are sorely inadequate. Dr. S. Rajpurkar and Ms. J. Coelho confirmed that areas and suggestions were made but these have yet to be passed by the management and purchase committee. Several computers in the library are not functional. The Scanner is not working properly and students are still not utilizing the Language Laboratory.
- High Definition Cameras are urgently required for security, safety and discipline. Blind spots need to be covered by cameras. This was supported by the Rector Fr. Magi Murzello in the last CDC meeting.

Criterion 5 - Student Support and Progression

- To report on the outcomes of the activities planned/completed by
 - 1. Career Counselling Centre and Placement Cell: Career Counselling conducted for various classes were recorded by Dr. S. Gonsalves in the Criteria 5 report attached. The Counselling Cell is considering a plan to tie up with Prafulta Cunselling Services.

The Placement Cell has conducted one Guest lecture on Personal Branding and Interview Insights and 2 Pre-placement talks (DeltaX and Headphone Zone)

- 2. Alumni Association: Has planned a Reunion night on 27 January 2024
- 3. Equal Opportunities Cell: No data received by the Criteria head
- 4. Women's Development Cell: (Details of activities conducted in Criteria 1 report)
- 5. <u>Student Council:</u> The Andrean Students League conducted various extra-curricular programmes such as Onam Celebration, Christmas Get-together and Christmas Party for Street Children
- 6. <u>Coaching for competitive exams:</u> Several sessions have been conducted to encourage students to take up the services. Past question papers and preparatory books are also made available to students through the Library resources.

Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

- 1. To address on the preparedness for NEP and cluster universities: Mr. J. Carvalho reported that the NEP Committee was set up under Co-ordinators Dr. H. Bhasin and Mr. A. Sood. Their work is in process. The Principal reminded the IQAC that affiliation will automatically end by 2035 and colleges that are not autonomous will automatically be pulled into a cluster. She also noted that it is now mandatory for even minority colleges to have a Government Nominee for the selection committee.
- 2. To address measures regarding punctuality by teaching and non-teaching staff: OnFees will be asked to provide feedback on staff entry and exit. CA K. Miranda suggested that staff must come to college at least 10 minutes before the first lecture. Staff having late lectures should be in college by 9 am. Warning to be given to staff who are late for their lectures.
- 3. To address the measures regarding period being marked ABSENT for teaching Staff o Onfees Portal/App: Mr. J. Carvalho confirmed that OnFees will be making the appropriate adjustments by January 22, 2024

*

4. To report on the outcome and implementation of wearing ID cards by teaching and non-teaching staff: Staff I cards to have bar code and Staff ID scanned at the entrance like the students, thus acting as a reminder to the staff to wear their ID.

Criterion 7 - Institutional Values and Best Practices

- 1. <u>Social Outreach Programme</u>: Dr. S. Rajpurkar provided a detailed report on the activities conducted for SOP for the Degree students (with Project Mumbai), and the SFC classes. Please see Criteria 7 report attached.
- 2. Entrepreneurship Cell, Incubation Cell and Start-Up Cell: conducted Food Bazaar, Business Bazaar and a session on Branding. They also launched a 40th anniversary edition of college merchandise and a special collection of college winter jackets
- 3. <u>Green initiatives</u>: A survey to set up a Butterfly garden was conducted in December 2023 while other activities are planned for January and February 2024. The NSS also took up a tree planation drive, several Beach cleanup exercises and a Mangrove cleanup as well.

The IQAC also discussed and suggested the following

- A chart detailing which activities fall under each criteria head will be displayed in each staffroom so that staff can identify to which criteria their reports should be sent
- A criteria email address to be set up for each criteria
- Reviving Debate, Elocution, Music and Drama competitions. Consolidating such competitions that different associations are having and aim to conduct intercollege competition of high standard by 2025-26
- Using a consolidated calendar such a google calendar to update planned activities which can be seen in real time. The objective is to avoid duplication, clashes and check availability of rooms. Perhaps the BSc.IT students could pick this as a Project
- The Book Club to be revived
- Selecting a personality for each month with a view to highlight achievers and enhance all-round knowledge of students
- All notices, reports and documents submitted to Criteria heads/IQAC must have the staff-in-charge signature.








2. Aavishkar Intra-collegiate Round

Cleaning, repair and maintenance of classrooms, roof & staff washrooms

- a. Cleaning, repair and maintenance of classrooms
 - i. Classrooms are cleaned regularly and no specific problem has been reported for the same.
 - ii. L1 & L2 classrooms on the fourth floor still have some minor POP repairs to be done because as per the contractor the original genuine material required for the work is in short supply. This work shall be completed as soon as possible.
- b. Cleaning, repair and maintenance of roof & staff washrooms
 - i. Roof on the fourth floor was thoroughly laid anew, the work started in last week of December and went on till about 9th January 2024. As stated above some minor finalisations are still to be done which shall be completed as soon as possible.
 - ii. Staff washrooms -
 - Ladies washroom on the 1st floor The flush in the last stall of washroom is to be repaired. A water tab also needs repairs due to leakage problem. The ladies washroom on the 2nd floor also has choking issues which needs repairs.
 - 2. Gents washroom on the 1st floor The water tab has leakage and needs to be repaired. Prof. Kevin Miranda has given multiple reminders for the same.
 - 3. Gents washroom on the 4th floor The washroom is not in useable. Multiple requests have been given for thorough repairs for this washroom.

While looking at above repair requests, the concerned person can do a general inspection of all the washrooms to fix minor issues being faced.

Follow-up maintenance of classroom projectors

- 1. The AMC for projector maintenance has expired as on 17th January 2024. The AMC was taken at a cost of Rs.2,00,000 p.a. from BVM Infotech. Office was exploring new vendors, V3 Computers, Unitech Solutions were contacted for the same, but both the vendors informed that they don't provide the specified service.
- 2. The projector lens in some of the classroom needs replacement as the same have gone very dim.
- 3. HDMI connectivity of projectors in some of the classrooms is missing, the same needs attention.

To suggest measures to deal with pigeon menace/nuisance

- 1. The pigeon net should be installed at all the places, some places such as opposite to the 3rd floor staffroom still requires the same.
- 2. The quality of the net should be such that it doesn't come off easily. The corners can be tugged higher quality net or in more comprehensive manner.
- 3. The peons should make sure that all the classroom windows are closed after the lectures, alternately for additional safety nets can be installed at such places too.


