#### I. To read and confirm the Minutes of the IQAC meeting held on 20 January, 2024:

The Minutes of the 20 January 2024 IQAC meeting were proposed by Dr. J. Bhatia and seconded by Mr. A. Sood.

**II. Matters arising from Agenda Item No.1:** There were no matters arising form Agenda Item No. 1.

#### III. To report on the following criteria of AQAR

#### Criteria 1: Curriculum Planning and Implementation

- 1. To report on the syllabus plan and completion for the second term:
  - Dr. V. Sibal reported that all departments had submitted the syllabus completion and all departments, except the BAMMC, had also submitted their Syllabus Planning.
- 2. To record the outcomes of the New Certificate, Add-on and Skill Based courses designed by departments with industry related applications for the academic year 2023-24:
  - Dr. V. Sibal shared the reports provided by the Certified Courses, Skill courses and UNESCO Diploma course. (see Annexure 1, Criteria 1 Report.)

**Dr. S. Thomas** suggested that feedback should be taken for all such courses and learning outcomes should include interpersonal skills such as planning, appreciation and team work. The courses should also provide proof of the same.

# 3. To provide an analysis of feedback forms given to Degree and Self – Financing students and parents on the curriculum:

The SFC and Degree College data was compiled by Mr. R. Sheth and presented to the IQAC. (Please see Annexure 2).

#### 4. To highlight the new curriculum with respect to NEP for FYs from 2024-25:

As an affiliated college, we are awaiting instructions from the University of Mumbai.

#### 5. To consider designing an online/self-paced course for credits:

Dr. S. Thomas clarified that the college can design such courses as part of the NEP.

#### Criteria 2: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

1. To list the workshops, conferences, seminars organised by departments for the second term:

Ms. V. Nair presented a consolidated list of all such activities. (See Annexure 3, Criteria 2 Report).

Principal Dr. M. Fernandes and IQAC Co-ordinator CA K. Miranda updated the IQAC that the CDC had suggested limiting the number of such activities to 12 per year.

**Dr. S. Thomas** suggested that departments make their suggestions, clearly stating the objectives. Then a *College Action Plan* for the year should be presented and passed by the CDC, at the beginning of the academic year.

Regarding *Objectives*, she reminded the IQAC that these should be in alignment with the course objectives, department objectives and college objectives (Vision and Mission). Only such activities should be conducted and these objectives can be spread across the 3 years.

That is essentially what would differentiate between a student graduating from a department at St. Andrew's as opposed to any other institution. (What are the Objectives, How were these achieved, what learning outcomes were attained and proof of the same need to be provided for each activity). CA K. Miranda reiterated that all major activities should end in January.

#### 2. To report on measures taken to reduce failures in TY examinations:

Ms. V. Nair presented a table detailing these measures taken by the various departments. (See Annexure 3, Criteria 2 Report).

# 3. To document the Mentoring undertaken by Mentors for the current academic year.:

Ms. V. Nair provided these statistics to the IQAC. (See Annexure 3, Criteria 2 Report).

# 4. To present the FY, SY, And TY Examination Schedule for 2023-24 (Semester II, IV, VI and ATKT):

This was presented in tabular form by Ms. V. Nair. (See Annexure 3, Criteria 2 Report).

#### 5. To communicate the NEP plan for Teaching, Learning and Evaluation:

Ms. V Nair updated the IQAC that the college was awaiting instructions from the University of Mumbai. Regarding the duration of lectures and managing the FY according to NEP and other classes in the traditional system, Dr. S. Thomas suggested the college should consult with about 3 other colleges, such as Ruia College, who implemented the NEP in 2023-24 for strategies.

Ms. J. Coelho updated the IQAC on the feedback response for the Final Year Degree and SFC students on Course Learning Outcomes and the Exit Poll. The deadline has been extended and the link will be resent to the Co-Ordinators to pass on the students. Any technical difficulties should be communicated to Onfees on the numbers provided or emailed to the IQAC if not resolved.

#### Criteria 3: Research, Innovation and Extension

# 1. To inform of extension activities organised by NSS, DLLE & SOP for the second term:

Dr. P. Shahi displayed the details of the activities conducted by NSS, DLLE and SOP. (See Annexure 4, Criteria 3 Report).

Dr. M. Fernandes informed the IQAC that the Degree college would be returning to Ms. Deepika Singh for SOP from June 2024. Ms. J. Coelho suggested that the college should approve of the list of NGO's the students will be working with for SOP, the work that they will be doing, the reportage required by the NGO and a copy of the MOU between Ms. Singh and the NGO should be shared with the college.

#### 2. To apprise of innovation activities undertaken:

Dr. P. Shahi shared the reports of the E Cell and Incubation Cell. (See Annexure 4, Criteria 3 Report)

#### 3. To acquaint with activities organised by the Research cell:

The Research Committee's report on staff and student (including Avishar) was given to the IQAC. Dr. S. Thomas updated the staff on numerous research funding opportunities that can be utilized.

# 4. To familiarize the committee with the NEP agenda for Research, Innovation and Extension.:

**Dr. S. Thomas** briefly touched upon the NRF (an NEP initiative). She also suggested applying for Inter Institution Grants, ICSSR grants, the Spencer Fund, Azim Premji foundation and MSFD. She kindly agreed to provide updates about these.

# 5. To enlighten about the AIACHE Conference and the Research policies that some colleges adopt:

Ms. J. Coelho updated the IQAC on measures taken by some AIACHE members such as Madras Chrisitian College to enhance research. (See Annexure 4, Criteria 3 Report).

#### **Criterion 4-Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

# 1. To provide an update on the cleaning, repair and maintenance of classrooms, corridor, roof & washrooms:

Mr. A. Sood confirmed that the roof repairs had been completed. He also mentioned that some classes urgently require painting to cover graffiti. Mr. A. Sood re-iterated the long standing request for HD CCTV. Mr. R. Sheth and Mr. A. Sood once again requested for the *Gents Staff Restroom* to be repaired urgently and for the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> floor restrooms to be cleaned properly.

#### 2. Follow-up maintenance of classrooms projectors:

Quotations for maintenance contracts have been received

#### 3. Measures taken to deal with pigeon menace:

Mr. A. Sood requested for all windows to be protected with netting. Currently, the pigeons are able to enter from several areas thus continuing the menace.

#### 4. To explore the possibility of enhancing the Library as a learning resource:

The Principal stressed the need for staff and students to use the library and also the online resources. Special library slots for each class should be made to induct the students on the use of online resources.

#### 5. To highlight New Infrastructure requirements under NEP:

More classrooms and Computer Labs would be required to meet the demands of NEP

# CA K. Miranda thanked the Principal for ensuring the software update on the OSM computers so that assessment could proceed smoothly.

#### **Criterion 5 - Student Support and Progression**

1. To document the outcome of the Career Counselling Centre and Placement Cell: Dr. S. Gonsalves presented the reports of the Placement Cell and College Counsellor. (See Annexure 5, Criteria 5 report)

With regards to low Placement numbers, Mr. R. Sheth suggested asking students at the beginning of the year whether they wanted interships, startups or further studies. This would help the Placement cell plan its strategy. It was also suggested to have an orientation for students applying for placements as to their responsibilities and expectations.

Dr. S. Gonsalves updated the IQAC that this is being held on 15 April 2024. (See Annexure 5, Criteria 5 report)

#### 3. To project the outcome of the Women's Development Cell activities:

The CWDC report was shared with the IQAC. (See Annexure 5, Criteria 5 report)

#### 4. To discuss the outcome of the events of Student Council:

The activities and initiatives of the Student Council were shared with the IQAC. (See Annexure 5, Criteria 5 report)

#### 5. To find ways of enhancing resources for competitive exams:

Dr. Gonsalves informed the IQAC of the talks and orientations conducted by the Competitive Exam cell. (See Annexure 5, Criteria 5 report0

# 6. To consider a few value-added modules of 10 minutes to help students & community to be undertaken by each department:

Dr. S. Gonsalves displayed a table indicating the various suggestions made by the various departments. (See Annexure 5, Criteria 5 report)

### **Extension activities organised by SOP (Degree College)**

The Social Outreach Programme for this Academic Year 2023-24 is in collaboration with Project Mumbai to increase exposure towards community engagement for the students. Project Mumbai is an NGO whose aim is to work towards establishing models of collaboration between the public sector, private sector, and individuals, to bring about social transformation through large-scale initiatives across numerous cities. Project Mumbai has come up with a list of activities that the SY students of BA/B.com need to undertake.

The activities conducted are as follows:

Jallosh- Cleaning Coasts while recycling plastic to provide amenities for the city such as benches, pencil boxes, and garbage bins.

- 1. Beach clean up Sessions were held from September to November
- 2. Students had to fill surveys post clean up sessions to grasp better understanding of the problem of pollution and what can be done to rectify that.

#### Plastic Recyclothon- With a pledge to reduce and recycle plastic

- 1. Project Mumbai arranged for drop off sites for plastic waste disposal at St Andrew's College and places closer to the students' homes from September to November.
- 2. Surveys were conducted by the students to learn more about plastic pollution and proper waste management of plastic waste disposal.

Naksha- Mapping initiatives of Mumbai's roads.

- 1. Students were allocated roads from within Mumbai to map out the historic, cultural significance from the months October to December.
- 2. They then had to take surveys and respond to the questions asked by answering all the questions about the specific roads.

Students must compulsorily finish a minimum of 20 hours of service. Student leader heads have been appointed for effective coordination and follow-up with their classmates. The Staff in charge will be acting as a liaison with Project Mumbai by giving in timely updates to the students.

Currently, the students are engaged in the three initiatives mentioned earlier and are actively participating in the SOP activities. Approximately 370 out of 412 students have provisionally fulfilled their SOP hour requirements. Ongoing efforts are being made to remind the remaining students to complete their 20 hours. Certificates have been provided to students who have met the 20-hour requirement, accompanied by evidence of their completed activities.

### **Social Outreach Programme 2023-24 (Self Finance)**

The Social Outreach Programme is marking its 17th year of operation. Founded in 2006, this noble initiative was conceptualized and launched by our esteemed Principal, Dr. Marie Fernandes, in collaboration with Fr. Allwyn D'Silva. The fundamental aim of this programme is deeply rooted in the teachings of Christ, emphasizing the importance of compassion and understanding towards the challenges and hardships faced by the economically disadvantaged and marginalized sectors of our society.

The programme holds a mandatory status for all second-year students enrolled in the degree courses at St. Andrew's College, including those pursuing Self-Financed courses. Participants are tasked with dedicating a minimum of 20 hours towards meaningful social service. Upon the completion of their service hours, students are required to compile and submit a detailed report, accompanied by a signed work record from the head of the respective NGO where they served.

For the academic year 2023-24, the Social Outreach Programme for students in Self-Financed courses, such as BSc I.T, BMM, BBI, BAF & BMS, is being orchestrated in partnership with our distinguished NGO collaborator, the Centre for Social Action (CSA).

Under the guidance of Fr. Joseph Gonsalves, the Director of CSA, the Centre has played a pivotal role in meticulously designing and structuring the SOP for this academic cycle. To ensure effective implementation and understanding of the programme's objectives, an online orientation

session has been arranged for the students. This session will be conducted jointly by the faculty members from St. Andrew's College and the dedicated team from the Centre for Social Action.

The outreach initiatives this year encompass a variety of intervention groups, each targeting specific areas of social need. These groups include:

- To grow and catalyze quality research in the nation, this policy envisions the establishment of a National Research Foundation (NRF).
- The overarching goal of the NRF will be to enable a culture of research to permeate through our universities. In particular, the NRF will provide a reliable base of merit-based but equitable peer-reviewed research funding, helping to develop a culture of research in the country through suitable incentives for and recognition of outstanding research, and by undertaking major initiatives to seed and grow research at State Universities and other public institutions where research capability is currently limited.
- The NRF will competitively fund research in all disciplines.
- Successful research will be recognized, and where relevant, implemented through close linkages with governmental agencies as well as with industry and private/philanthropic organizations.
- Institutions that currently fund research at some level, such as the Department of Science and Technology (DST), Department of Atomic Energy (DAE), Department of Bio-Technology (DBT), Indian Council of Agriculture Research (ICAR), Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), Indian Council of Historical Research (ICHR), and University Grants Commission (UGC), as well as various private and philanthropic organizations, will continue to independently fund research according to their priorities and needs. However, NRF will carefully coordinate with other funding agencies and will work with science, engineering, and other academies to ensure synergy of purpose and avoid duplication of efforts. The NRF will be governed, independently of the government, by a rotating Board of Governors consisting of the very best researchers and innovators across fields.

- The primary activities of the NRF will be to:
  - (a) fund competitive, peer-reviewed grant proposals of all types and across all disciplines;
  - (b) seed, grow, and facilitate research at academic institutions, particularly at universities and colleges where research is currently in a nascent stage, through mentoring of such institutions;
  - (c) act as a liaison between researchers and relevant branches of government as well as industry, so that research scholars are constantly made aware of the most urgent national research issues, and so that policymakers are constantly made aware of the latest research breakthroughs; so as to allow breakthroughs to be optimally brought into policy and/or implementation; and
  - (d) recognise outstanding research and progress







#### **Aided Section**

The Social Outreach Programme for this Academic Year 2023-24 was conducted in collaboration with Project Mumbai.

It has three initiatives namely-

- > Jallosh (Beach cleaning),
- > Naksha (Road Mapping),
- ➤ Plastic Recyclothon (Recycling, Management, and Utility of Plastic Waste).

The students are currently working on the three aforementioned initiatives and have been actively involved in the SOP activities.

#### Evaluation-

- 1. **Engagement with community needs** The Second Year (BA and BCOM) students worked with Project Mumbai. This allowed them to actively immerse themselves in community engagement while being able to closely understand the problems and issues faced by the locals of the community.
- 2. **Development of Interpersonal skills** The students interacted with people from different facets of the community which provided them with the necessary development of their interpersonal skills.
- 3. **Effective organizational skills** The activities conducted for SOP enabled the students to hone their organizational skills. This was understood by their interaction and collaboration to complete the assigned tasks. The students also learnt to coordinate and get work done from their fellow students.
- 4. **Sensitivity towards the environment** Activities like Jallosh (Beach Cleanup) and Plastic Recyclothon presented an opportunity for the students to learn about the importance of conservation of the environment and the need for Waste Management.
- 5. **Improved observational skills** Activity like **Naksha** (Roadmapping) enabled students to meticulously observe the respective roads and thereby providing them with a basic understanding of the culture of the place.
